

CIVIC WORK OF CARTER GIVEN PRAISE AT DINNER

More than 150 Fort Worth citizens, representing practically every field of endeavor, Thursday night entertained with a dinner at River Crest Country Club in honor of Amon G. Carter. The dinner was given in recognition of Carter's efforts and success in the advancement and upbuilding of Fort Worth.

As an expression of their appreciation of his work, the hosts presented Carter with a sterling silver tray. The presentation speech was made by W. C. Stripling, Carter's personal friend since his boyhood.

Dinner was served in the main dining room of the club, the tables being arranged in gridiron fashion. The room was lighted with varicolored tapers, mounted in silver candelabra, and the speakers' table was banked with carnations, primroses and fern.

Meacham Toastmaster.

H. C. Meacham was toastmaster, introducing 11 men who spoke on the various phases of Carter's activities since he came to Fort Worth. The speakers included Leon Gross, Morris Berney, T. B. Yarbrough, George H. Clifford, John P. King, J. Mentor Caldwell, Sidney L. Samuels, Dr. Webb Walker, W. N. Moore, R. K. Hanger and W. C. Stripling.

Each speaker expressed particular appreciation for the part the honor guest had played in the building of the Chevrolet Motor Company plant, the W. T. Waggoner building, The Texas, the Methodist Hospital, the Y. M. C. A. and the Fort Worth Club.

"Had it not been for his untiring energy, and unswerving faith in the city, the skyline of Fort Worth would be far different from what it is today," one of the speakers declared.

Champion Salesman.

Speaking of Carter's work in bringing to Fort Worth the annual convention of the American Petroleum Institute last month, Caldwell characterized him as "the world's champion salesman."

"He took a Parker County watermelon and sold it for \$5,000,000 worth of advertising for Fort Worth and Texas," he declared.

Hanger, speaking for the younger generation of professional men, declared that he had an abiding faith in the future of Fort Worth, "a faith based upon the past performances of such men as Carter."

The toastmaster described the honor guest as the man referred to in a legend on the cornerstone of one of the postoffice buildings in New York: "Nor rain, nor sleet, nor heat, nor cold, nor any circumstances shall ever stop his feet."

Great Possibilities Seen.

Carter, in accepting the gift tray, declared there is not a better place in the world to live than Fort Worth. "Fort Worth is growing and will continue to grow," he said. "It has the greatest possibilities of any city in the Nation."

Reporting on the sale of second mortgage bonds in the Fort Worth Club Building, Carter said that \$550,000 worth had been disposed of to date and that tentative subscriptions already made will take up nearly all of the remaining portion of the \$600,000 issue. The building and furnishings, he said, will cost \$1,900,000.

The face of the tray presented Carter was heavily scrolled and in the center was the inscription: "Presented January 22nd, 1925, to Amon Giles Carter by the citizens whose names appear on the reverse side, as a slight token of their appreciation of his efforts and success in the upbuilding and advancement of Fort Worth."

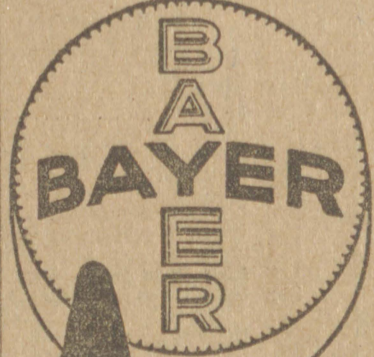
