This must be the Manuscript Keats left in his Shakespeare and wrote for to George Keats from Teignmouth. He mentioned it in two letters to Reynolds:-

- 1. 27 April, 1818. 'I have written for my folio Shakespeare in which there is the first few stanzas of my "Pot of Basil". I have the rest here finished.'
- 2. 3 May, 1818. (I have written to George for the first stanzas of my Isabel I shall have them soon and will copy the whole out for you.
