Dear Mr. Schulz:

I hope you will not forget me on the little fragment I wanted from your meteorite. It need not be substantial—something like a small fingernail size or say  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch flake would do.

I am going to New York on a dry goods company trip leaving January 15th and want to take this to a museum there or in Washington and have it checked for classification. As I told you when I was there, I think this will turn out to be what is technically called a bronzite or hypersthene chondrite. These names of minerals refer merely to an iron magnesium silicate, and the hypersthene has more iron in combination in it than the bronzite. The "chondrite" part of the classification name refers to small grains or spherical bodies that show up on close examination of the interior.

I hope you can also give me the weight of the main mass and if possible also the weight of the slice you cut off and a guess at the weight of the piece your brother took. By the way, I failed to ask you his name and address. There is probably not a ghost of a chance that he has that scrap but if you will give me the information I would like to ask him. He might have thrown it in some box about the place or at some spot in the yard where it could be retrieved.

Thanks again for your co-operation, and I wish you a happy 1965.
