and will want the remaining
pieces for samples. I am
quite convinced they are
pieces of the meteorite, but
am aware of the fact that

am wrong don't hesitate to
tell me as quickly as you
would if I was right. I
have drawn a rough sketch
of the section of the birds
and inclose it.
