In such a case, how would we send the various envelopes to you? Could they be sent in a single package parcel post or express? Your help by answering these inquiries will be much appreciated, as we are anxious to handle the matter correctly if we go into it.

Routes No.1 & 2 would be in territory mentioned. Route 1 has 110 boxes and route No.2 has 81 boxes. Crescent route No.4 would also be in this path. These could be wrapped in bundles for each route and sent from your post office or sent here as you wish. It would save you the parcel post charges if they were mailed direct from your post office. Do not know the number of boxes on Crescent route 4 but there would be close to 100. You could ascertain the exact number by writing the postmaster at Crescent.
