## THE FIRST SUMMER TERM

- 1. <u>Class Rolls</u> for the First Term of the Summer will be mailed to the teachers on the 15th of July. These have been checked carefully against the Matriculation Cards. If every one has given us correct information the rolls should be quite accurate.
- 2. Final examinations for the first six weeks are to be given at the regular class hour on the 17th, the closing recitation for the first term.
- 3. <u>Grades</u>, in duplicate, should be in the office of each Dean not later than 9 A.M. on the 20th, and should reach the Registrar's Office by 10 A.M. on that date. Promptness on the part of everyone will insure efficient service.
- 4. All teachers are urgently requested to post their grades on the bulletin board nearest their class meeting place, that the students may be informed. No grades are to be sent out from the Registrat's Office until the close of the Second Term.

### THE SECOND SUMMER TERM

- 1. <u>Registration</u> for the Second Summer Term will be concentrated in the Science Building, Monday, the 20th. A detailed instruction sheet has been prepared to guide in this registration (see attached). The hours will be 8:00 to 12:00 and 1:30 to 4:00. The same general procedure will prevail as that used at the opening of the First Term, June 8.
- 2. <u>Students</u> who have already registered for the Second Term, and now desire to drop, add, or change a course, are to do so on the 20th, on the schedule announced in the Registration Instruction sheet.

Those whose last names begin with A to K are to come in the forenoon and those coming within L to Z are to come in the afternoon to distribute the work equitably.

3. Keep in mind that Baccalaureate and Commencement for the Summer will be held on Sunday, August 30.
