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## MELLETT LECTURE, JOURNALISM CLINIC HERE

Attention of all is called to the big journalistic program on the campus this weekend. It is most significant and warrants the strong support of everyone.

Friday afternoon and Saturday morning, several hundred high school students will attend a clinic in the Little Theater. Top newspapermen of the city, members of the Sigma Delta Chi professional society, will lecture. First session: 3:30 p. m., Friday.

Highlight of the program will be the annual Don R. Mellett lecture in Ed Landreth Auditorium at 8 p. m. Friday. Edward Mowery, famed New York reporter who won the Pulitzer Prize last year for helping free an innocent man from prison, will be the speaker. He promises the "inside dope." Warren Agee will preside at all sessions.

Having the Mellett Lecture is quite an honor. It is given annually at a different university over the nation and it takes about 10 years to land it after making a bid. TCU is having it this week through the foresight of the late J. Willard Ridings who issued our invitation many years ago.
