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ACADEMIC HONESTY

This week, Dr. Charles R. Sherer of the Student Welfare Committee sent an important letter to all faculty members. We hope you read it carefully.

Welfare Committee has taken over the ticklish job from the Academic Honesty group which was discontinued. Welfare has had two meetings on the subject and heard a report of a sub-committee headed by Bitia Mae Hall. This week's letter resulted.

After quoting the catalogue (page 47) on University rules in this area, three pro- cedure steps were set up: (1) Any teacher may refer any case of dishonesty to the Welfare Committee if for some reason the teacher does not wish to handle the case.

(2) In all cases where disciplinary action for academic dishonesty is administered by the teacher, a report of the case and the action taken should be sent to the chairman of the Welfare Committee so that repeated offenses can be determined.

(3) Any case which seems to warrant disciplinary action more severe than loss of credit for the course should be referred directly to the Welfare Committee.
