SCHEDULE OF FINAL EXAMINATIONS - FALL SEMESTER

January 25-29, 1954

Instructions

1. A period of two hours is provided for each examination. It is essential that each examination begin and close promptly.
2. Instructors will turn in their grades (in duplicate) to their department heads within 24 hours after each examination, except that the grades for examinations given on Friday, the 29th, are due by 11:00 a.m. Saturday, the 30th, to give the IBM Office a chance to process the grades that afternoon, and make the grade run for the Spring registration. The Deans are to gather the grades from the department heads each day during examination week, retain one copy, and forward the other promptly to the Registrar's office.
3. Teachers are urged to post grades outside their offices as soon as the grades are assigned, for information of their students.
4. Students completing degree requirements in Jan. 1954, will take their final examinations along with the others on the regular schedule.
