# DR. SADLER MAKES STATEMENT ON FIELDHOUSE

As the Bulletin went to press, Dr. M. E. Sadler issued the statement below in <sup>regard</sup> to the building program and the need for the new fieldhouse:

"During the past 13 years, I have been very greatly interested in the program of Inter-Collegiate Athletics at TCU. I have been anxious for us to help improve any aults which the total program of athletics might have, so that this important phase of Our life could move along in increasingly satisfactory fashion. The developments which we have made in recent years in our basketball program have been especially satisfying to me.

The burning of the old fieldhouse was most unfortunate. We desperately need and  $w_e$  shall secure a new and adequate fieldhouse at the earliest possible moment.

However, we should not lose sight of the fact that we are primarily an educational institution. For anyone to suggest that we might sidetrack such items as the library, School of Business buildings or other needed academic facilities in order that we might build a fieldhouse is to misinterpret the major objectives and purposes of our institution.

The next building which we will start in the general building program will be the enlargement of our library. We shall go along with the library work and the School of Business buildings and the arrangements for other academic activities just as we have planned. In the meanwhile, if it is possible for us to secure funds from additional <sup>sources</sup> with which to erect a fieldhouse, we shall certainly start its construction as <sup>early</sup> as possible.

If funds are not available from additional sources for the fieldhouse, we shall bave to make some other plans for our basketball until these other buildings which are to desperately needed in our academic work are constructed."
