THIS WEEK'S SPOTLIGHT PERSONALITY :

Dr. Ralph Russell Guenther, professor of music. His "In Silver Moonlight" for women's voices won second prize in the state-wide composition contest of the Texas Guild of Composers and his "Deduction" will be performed on the third annual Southwest Symposium of Contemporary Music at the University of Texas in April.

Tall, friendly and gifted, Ralph Guenther was born at Concordia, Missouri, Nov. 24, 1914. He took his B.A. from Central College, Fayette, Mo., in 1938; his M.A. from Eastman School of Music at the University of Rochester in 1939 and his Ph.D. from the same school in 1948. He taught in Lexington, Mo., Butler, Mo., and Sedalia, Mo., high schools.

He traveled in England and on the continent in 1936 and during the war served in the South Pacific as a first lieutenant in the Marine Corps. He came to TCU in 1948 as head of the music theory division; was made associate professor of music in 1950 and professor in 1953.

With his wife Lavonne, Ralph lives at 4725 Staples. They have two daughters, Randie Jean 10 and Sally Jane 7. Many of his compositions have been published. The latest: "I Look to Thee" and "Psalm 100." He's a Methodist, belongs to Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, Texas Music Teachers Association, Texas Music Education Association and was president, 1951-1952, of the Fort Worth Music Teachers Association.
