THIS WEEK'S SPOTLIGHT PERSONALITY

For his outstanding work in contacting and promoting good will for TCU among public school teachers, administrators and students of the State, the Bulletin is happy to salute Dr. Leslie P. Evans this week. The quiet, capable and hard-going professor of education is an expert in Public School Administration and adolescent psychology.

Les Evans was born in Brownwood in 1911; graduated from high school there. He took his B.A. from Howard Payne in 1932; M.A. from U. of T. in 1940 and Ph.D. from same school in 1948. He was a high school principal from 1932 to 1940, was in the U. S. Civil Service 1940-1943, was an electronic technician in the U. S. Navy, 1943-1945, a student and instructor at U. of T. 1945-1947.

He's a member of the Christian Church, belongs to the TSTA, NEA, National Conference of Professional Education Administrators, the A.A.S.A. and the Alpha Chi and Phi Delta Kappa fraternities. He came to TCU June 1, 1948, as assistant professor of education, was made associate in 1951 and full professor in 1953. With his wife, Gurthelle Lenox Evans, he lives at 3828 Winslow Drive. They have one daughter, Rebecca Anne, born in 1949.

With his practical experience in public school education and his wide acquaintance among teachers and administrators, Dr. Evans is an invaluable contact. He's always ready to visit schools and contact students. He's genial, capable and willing. We're mighty glad to have him around!
