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# THIS WEEK'S SPOTLIGHT PERSONALITY:

Samuel Ward Hutton, registrar and professor of Worship Ministries whose retirement in September has just been announced. The genial and efficient S. W. (affectionately known as "Side Winder" and "Side Window") has long been a campus favorite. He has left his friendly mark on hundreds of graduates.

Born in Crawfordsville, Ind., in 1886, S. W. graduated from Grand Junction, Colo., high and studied at Colorado Agricultural College and Oklahoma Christian U. (now Phillips) 1904-1909. He took his B.A. from TCU in 1911, studied at Chicago and Boston Universities in the 1920's and took a B.D. from TCU in 1931.

Starting as assistant pastor at Fort Worth's First Christian Church in 1909, he was pastor at Riverside Christian, director of Religious Education at Magnolia Avenue Christian, Southwest Superintendent of Religious Education (1913-1924), associate secretary of the United Christian Missionary Society, supply teacher at Phllips U. and recently minister of the churches at Whitesboro and Palo Pinto.

He came to TCU in September, 1929, as assistant professor of religion. He was named registrar in 1932 and professor of Worship Ministries in 1936. He is a member of the American Association of College Registrars, was president of the Texas Association and the Southern Association of registrars and is secretarytreasurer of the Fort Worth Torch Club.

He married Dixie Williams and they have two daughters, Mary Frances Raugh and Anne Hightower. He makes his home at 2560 Greene. An expert in religious music, he published "Worship & Hymns" in 1930 and "Worship Highways" in 1943 with Dr. Noel Keith. He's a top hand at leading sing-songs and knows the history and author of all the well-loved hymns.

For his long years of faithful service, for his great influence for good, for his fine co-operation, the Bulletin is delighted to salute Samual Ward Hutton this week!
