#### THIS WEEK'S SPOTLIGHT PERSONALITY:

Artemisia B. Bryson, associate professor of English, whose retirement in September was announced at the last Board meeting. Known affectionately by many generations of TCU graduates, Mrs. Bryson completed exactly 30 years of service in January, 1954.

Born in Summitville, Ind., she graduated from Hamilton College, Ky., and later studied at Transylvania. She took her A.B. from TCU in 1924 and her M.A. from the University of Chicago in 1926. She did summer study at Harvard in 1929 and the U. of Texas 1932, 1942.

From 1919 to 1924 she worked in the office of the Texas Missionary Society. She married Prof. Walter E. Bryson, popular teacher who was head of the TCU English department until his sudden death in 1922. The Bryson Poetry Society was also named in his honor.

Mrs. Bryson is a member of the Christian Church, the Council of English Teachers, the Modern Language Association, Texas Poetry Society, the TCU Women Exes and other professional and social organizations. She traveled in Europe in 1938 and extensively in Mexico. She has published articles in the Texas Outlook, American Journal of Education, American Speech, Christian-Evangelist and book reviews in the Southwest Review, Star-Telegram and Texas Outlook. She has a daughter, Mrs. A. W. Blair, and makes her home at 2917 Princeton Street.

Mrs. Bryson became assistant professor in 1932 and associate professor in 1945. Kindly, cultured and quietly dedicated to TCU and her students, she has written a large page in the University's history. The Bulletin is most happy to salute her this week!
