Calvin Artimus Cumbie who becomes registrar next fall. The slightly-built, energetic and keen East Texan has had an interesting career in educational and military circles.

Born in Athens, July 19, 1922, Calvin graduated from high school there. He took his B.A. from North Texas State in 1943 and won his M.A. from the same school in 1948. He took an M. Ed. from TCU in 1951 and B. S. from TCU in 1953. He also studied at the College of Puget Sound in Tacoma, Wash., 1944-1945.

The war interrupted his academic career. He entered the Army in 1943 serving until March 1, 1946. He taught at San Marcos Military Academy 1946-1947 and Texas Military College at Terrell, 1947-1949. On May 1, 1951, he was recalled to active army duty and served until Aug. 1952. He holds the rank of captain in the Army Reserve.

He came to TCU in June, 1949, as assistant registrar. He's a member of University Baptist Church, the Reserve Officers' Association, Alpha Phi Omega, Phi Delta Kappa (Education) and Phi Omega Pi (Business). He is unmarried and lives at 3141 Cockrell.

Hard-working and friendly, well equipped by training and experience, the Bulletin is happy this week to salute Calvin A. Cumbie. May his work increase!

... early to teaching; he was a fellow at TCU and Texas (1925-1928) and moved as instructor to full professor at Texas State College for Women (1928-1943). He moved to TCU fulltime Sept. 1, 1943, as professor of Spanish, dean of Addition, director of Summer School, member of admissions committee. Later he became chairman of the department of Foreign Languages and secretary of the Board. After years of great service, Jerome is director, chairman, member of 22 committees ranging from Deans Council to Space Allocation.

With all his jobs, he has found time for many other things. He's a member of University Christian Church, South Central Modern Language Assn., American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese, the Rotary Club, and Alpha Chi. He was secretary (1951-52) of the Texas State Teachers Assn., and a director (1953). He's traveled extensively in Europe, Cuba, Canary Islands and has visited Mexico six times since 1941. He was Honorary Consul of Mexico here 1950-1952. He was named honorary member of the Texas Good Neighbor Commission in 1952. He's a fine speaker; a strong writer.

Moore married Ruby Scott, TCU history of the late 1920's, and they have one son, Jerry A. Moore II. They live at 2905 Merida. For his great and on-going contribution to the life of TCU and for the honor of his election by the Association of Colleges, the Bulletin is delighted to salute Jerome Moore this week!
