THIS WEEK'S SPOTLIGHT PERSONALITY:

Dr. Willis Hewatt, chairman of biology-geology, on the occasion of his 15th annual marine biology trip to the Gulf Coast. With wife Elizabeth (staff member and retiring president of Faculty Women's Club), they left Thursday with a party of 41.

Born in Gainesville in 1904, Willis G. Hewatt graduated from Fort Worth Poly high; took BA from TCU in 1927 and MA in 1929. He won his Ph.D. from Leland Stanford in 1933. From 1929-1931 he was chairman biology-chemistry department of Tyler Junior College; taught summers at North Texas State and Leland Stanford, 1929-1934.

He came to TCU in the fall of 1933 as assistant professor of biology, was made associate in 1937, full professor in 1940 and department chairman in 1953. He held a TCU fellowship 1927-29; the Royal Victor Fellowship at Stanford 1933; was President of the Texas Academy of Science 1952; was president North Texas Biological Society 1939. Is a member of half dozen learned societies with strange names such as "Limnologists, Herpetological, Systematistic, Ecological."

Fun-loving and hard-working, Willis is a TCUer of the TCU's. Even his daughter Joan married cage star Johnny Swaim. He has another married daughter, Beth. His mother-in-law, Mrs. Georgia Harris, was TCU dietitian for many years. TCU is a family career for the Hewatts.

As expert on oyster and marine life, Dr. Hewatt has worked summers at L.S.U., University of Puerto Rico, Woods Hole, Mass., and the Virginia State Fisheries Lab, Yorktown, Va. Hardy and happy, the Hewatts like to camp out on trips or While doing lab work. They are highly popular with their students.

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TCU-BRITISH STUDENT EXCHANGE:

The English-Speaking Union, Fort Worth branch, is trying to arrange for a TCU-University of London student exchange. Any TCU student who is male, between 19 and 25, with one or more years of college is eligible.

The plans call for the Union to pay transportation, including ocean trip and inland passage, while the parents or guardian of the TCU student would pay all the normal expenses, such as tuition, board, etc., of the British student at TCU. The British parents would pay like expenses for the TCU boy at the University of London.
