Lt. Col. John William Murray, professor of Military Science and Tactics. Now awaiting orders to move on to his next assignment, under Army policy, Bill Murray has become in three years a popular member of the TCU faculty in every sense of the word.

Born in Seattle, Wash., in 1907, J. W. graduated from Franklin high there. He took his B. S. degree from State College of Washington 1932; later studied at the University of Washington, State College again and the Army's famed Command and General Staff School (1945).

He's traveled in Alaska, Canada, Japan and Korea. He's a member of the National Defense Trans. Assn.; the Scabbard and Blade and Crimson Circle while in college; the Masonic lodge and Phi Delta Theta. He went on active Army duty in December 1941 and has served since. He was Asst. PMST at the University of Washington, 1949-1951, before coming to TCU. He is active in the Episcopal Church; holds Army Commendation Ribbon with pendant.

Bill is married, has two daughters, Mary Jane 10 and Betty Jean 8. Wife Myrtle is popular with everyone and has been active in Faculty Women's Club. They live at 2600 Shirley.
