THIS WEEK'S SPOTLIGHT PERSONALITY:

Dr. Robert E. Robertson, assistant professor of philosophy. On the night of May 3, when "TCU Night" is held at LaGrave Field and half the proceeds of the sale of a block of tickets goes to the Campus YMCA, no little of the credit must go to the energetic young man from Wisconsin.

Bob Robertson was born in Milwaukee in 1919. He graduated from the Shorewood high school there and took B. A. (1942) and M. A. (1947) from the U. of Wisconsin. Working at the U. of Texas 49-53, he earned his Ph. D. in philosophy. He had been ticketed for an M. D. in the family tradition but an early course in philosophy changed all that.

In the Army from 1942-1946, he served in Intelligence as an interpreter. His duties carried him to England, France, Belgium, Germany, Panama and Japan. Back home, he married the girl next door, Miss Jane Stover, who had been with the Milwaukee Journal for seven years. They came to Texas and TCU in 1947 and like both very much. The feeling is mutual.

Although he can be profound (he astonished the Kiwanis Club of University Area with his lecture "The Theory of the Good"), Bob likes people and action. On campus, he is sponsor of Student Congress, the Philosophy Club and is faculty advisor to the Y. He's a member of Kiwanis, Torch Club and SW Philosophical Ass'n. He pitches into any job that comes along with a will.

For his leadership, energy, devotion to student efforts and willingness, the Bulletin says: "Salutos Senor Bob."

FINAL EXAMINATION SCHEDULE - SPRING SEMESTER May 24-28, 1954.

Instructions:

- 1. Each examination is scheduled for a period of two hours and should begin and close promptly.
- 2. Instructors will turn in their grades to their Department Chairmen (in duplicate) within 24 hours after each examination. The Deans are to gather the grades from the departments of their schools each day during examination week, and on the same day turn original copy to the Registrar's Office. The last grades are to reach the Registrar's Office not later than noon Saturday, May 29th.
- 3. By following the above schedule the IBM Operator can process the grades in time for early mailing to patrons and clear the way for Summer Registration.
- 4. Teachers are urged to post grades outside their offices as the grades are assigned, in order that their students may have the information promptly.
- 5. Grades on students graduating May 30 (Sunday) must reach the Registrar not later than Thursday, May 27, at 9:00 A.M., on single copy forms (blue) provided for this purpose. Graduating students may take final examinations at the regularly assigned hours through Wednesday, May 26. For other graduating students whose examinations would come on Thursday or Friday, the time may be scheduled by the teacher at an earlier hour.
