THIS WEEK'S SPOTLIGHT PERSONALITY:

Louis W. Ramsey, superintendent of buildings and grounds. This week, the thousands of visitors for the Religion Center dedication and convention of the Christian Church remarked often on the beauty of the campus and the many facilities provided. For much of which L. W. can take a bow. He labored especially long on the dedication setup which was just about perfect in every detail. ✓

Born in Columbus, Texas, in 1904, Louis Wette Ramsey graduated from high school there. He took his B. S. degree from A&M (1922) and M. S. in math (1947). He also studied at the University of Texas for three summer periods.

In 1927-1932, he was city engineer for the city of Bryan; taught math at TCU 1932-1938; was in business for himself and returned to TCU 1940-41. He was at Arkansas State College before returning to our campus in 1945 for the third time as assistant professor of math. He received permanent tenure in 1948 and took over buildings and grounds in June 1953.

A member of the Episcopal church, he also belongs to the Association for Advance of Science, Math Association of America, Texas Academy of Science, Kappa Mu Epsilon and other groups. In 1943 he published "How to Use a Slide Rule." Asked about his honors, the quiet and unassuming L. W. replied: "None that I recall."

But he's not without honors on this campus. Always co-operative and able, he's on hand when things are needed. From broken window panes and leaky faucets to planning new buildings, he's ready to serve. Mrs. Ramsey (Beatrice) is secretary in the Graduate School office. For their hard work, loyalty, friendly help in many fields, The Bulletin is happy to salute the Ramsey family this week.
