Men uncover only during prayers. At all other times, caps are worn even if the speaker or speakers take off theirs. Don't forget!

STUDENT RECRUITMENT COMPLETED

Dr. Richardson reports that T.C.U.'s most successful campaign of high school visitation has been completed. In all, 1,200 high school seniors were personally contacted and over 500 requested bulletins and other materials. They were from 125 high schools.

Some 40 faculty and staff members took part in this important work. And they got results. Calvin Cumbie reported that 144 applications for next fall have already been received -- compared to only 45 at the same time last year. If the ratio holds, things will really be looking up in our enrollment.

Congrats to Dean Richardson and all those who had a part in the work. It was by far the best campaign in TCU history.

DR. GUENTHER HONORED

PERIODICAL COLLECTION

A 27-year collection of French periodicals is now in the Graduate School office. The file will be placed in the library when Dean A. T. DeGroot has finished his research. The periodicals, "Irenikon," are to be used for research study on Protestant and Catholic relations.

This is the only collection in this area and was obtained through the Belgium Roman Catholic Benedictines. Dean DeGroot has corresponded with a priest for nearly two years before the file was complete. The collection, purchased through the research fund, is valued at \$250. DR. MORGAN YOUNG REPORTS

Dr. Morgan Young of the TCU staff, on leave to work with the U.S. Operations Mission to Ecuador, recently brought Otto Nielsen up-to-date on his duties.

Stationed at Quito, Dr. Young reports that the FOA has three missions in Ecuador: Agriculture, health and education. The staff from the U.S. has instructional supervision of four elementary schools in Quito and is developing them into demonstration centers for new methods and materials.

They are also developing a model teacher-training program. Says Young: "We cannot praise too highly the reception given us by the Ecuadorians and their interest in improving education within the Republic. The challenge is great."

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PURELY PERSONAL

Dr. Sandy Wall will have a leave of absence during the summer. He will teach version special courses in philosophy and history of education at the University of Colorado.

Dr. W.L. Reed will speak at the Fellowship Dinner of the First Christian Church in Iowa Park, Monday.

An award of Fellowship in Business has been given Dr. August O. Spain. The award is from the Foundation of Economics Education and is for the latter part of this summer. He will study the operations of ALCOA, starting with orientation at headquarters in Pittsburg and then visiting some of the primary production installations out in the field. The company and other big businesses co-operate with the Foundation in the conduct of the College-Business Exchange Program.

Another Ph. D. will be added to our list when John L. Wortham of the economics department received his from the University of Texas at the June commencement. His dissertation was titled, "A Description of the Basic Sales Forecasting Principles with a Specific Application to a Truck Trailer Manufacturing Firm."
