VISITING LECTURER

Dr. Kenneth C. Heald, head of the production division of the Gulf Oil Company for many years, has been named a visiting lecturer in geology in the science department.

A nationally known expert in stratigraphy, he will lecture to students in geology on a fairly regular schedule. Dr. Heald took his B.S. degree from Colorado College, studied at Yale and spent 15 years with the U.S. geological survey division. He was associate professor at Yale, 1924-25, and then went with Gulf, serving until his retirement in 1953. He then moved to Fort Worth and opened a consulting office.
