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#### J.S. GOVERNMENT GRANTS FOR LECTURING ABROAD

There are openings for university and college lecturers for a limited number of eaching opportunities in the exchange program under the Fulbright Act. New countries co-operating in the project include Brazil, Chili, Formosa, Colombia, Cuba, Guatemala, Iran, Israel, Korea, Mexico, Panama, Paraguay, Syria, Turkey, Iruguay, and others.

Lecturers are desired for full academic year and for shorter periods during 1955-56 in American history and literature, chemistry, economics, education, engineering, geology, library science, physical education, physics, political science, psychology, guidance and counseling, tests and measurements, teaching of English as a foreign anguage and other fields.
