GRANTS FOR LECTURING ABROAD

Dr. A. O. SPAIN will be at St. Mary's University in San Antonio Friday to deliver a lecture on "The United States and Russia in the United Nations." Appearing on the same program will be Father Nolan, Society of Jesuits, who will speak on "Russia in Action." The lecture is a part of the Institute of International Affairs at the university.

Dr. GLENN ROUTT will be one of the five speakers at the Fall Regional Conference of the Interseminary Movement, Southwest Region in Austin Nov. 3-5.

JAMES STERRETT and CHARLES LEHMAN have been appointed consultants in the field of art and music education in the Cleburne Public School System. Appointments were made by Superintendent Murphy.

The C. H. Stoelting Psychological Corporation in Chicago will build the tonoscope designed by Dr. CHARLES F. LEHMAN. The company will make the pioneer model and are interested in manufacturing it for marketing. The machine is an electronic apparatus of audio-visual nature. It will be used for helping young children to place their voices.

Dr. JAMES COSTY, Mrs. DOROTHY BELL, and Dr. E. L. PROSS have returned from the 29th Annual Texas Speech Association Convention in Austin. Dr. PROSS was elected vice-president of the group for 1954-55 and under rules of the organization will advance to the presidency the following year.

Dr. WILLIAM REED will participate in the Preaching Mission and School at First Christian Church in Wichita Falls, Oct. 10-15.

Returning from Baytown tomorrow will be Prof. JACK SUGGS. He has been in Baytown teaching the "Life and Teachings of Jesus" in the local leadership training school.

Dr. NEWTON S. GAINES will spend Oct. 14-17 at the University of Oklahoma's Lake Texoma biological station. He will be there to speak on "Interest-Holding Physics Demonstrations" at the meeting of the National Association of Science Teachers. Newsweek ran an article entitled "Physics in Texas" about the professor.

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U. S. GOVERNMENT GRANTS FOR LECTURING ABROAD

There are openings for university and college lecturers for a limited number of teaching opportunities in the exchange program under the Fulbright Act. New countries co-operating in the project include Brazil, Chili, Formosa, Colombia, Cuba, Guatemala, Iran, Israel, Korea, Mexico, Panama, Paraguay, Syria, Turkey, Uruguay, and others.

Lecturers are desired for full academic year and for shorter periods during 1955-56 in American history and literature, chemistry, economics, education, engineering, geology, library science, physical education, physics, political science, psychology, guidance and counseling, tests and measurements, teaching of English as a foreign language and other fields.
