ANNOUNCEMENTS FROM THE DIRECTOR OF THE SUMMER SCHOOL

1. All instructors are requested to report to Dean Thomas F. Richardson, names of students officially enrolled in your classes, but who have never attended classes this six weeks.

2. Also please report to Dean Richardson, the names of persons officially on your class rolls who have been absent enough times this term to make it impossible to pass the course. Dates of absences should be indicated.

3. Registration for the Second Six Weeks will be held on Monday, July 18th. The following procedures will apply:

- a. Registration for those who did not attend the First Six Weeks will originate in the Office of the Registrar between 9 a.m. and 12:00 noon; and between 1:00 and 4:30 p.m.
- b. Students who registered for both the First and Second Six Weeks, but who do not expect to continue during the Second Six Weeks should drop their courses in the Registrar's Office on Monday, July 18th, or before.
- c. Students who enrolled for the First Six Weeks, but did not enroll for the Second Six Weeks, and who now, wish to attend may add courses on July 18th.
- d. Students who registered for the Second Six Weeks but who desire to make changes (Drops, Adds or Change of Sections) may do so on Monday, July 18th.
- e. Classes for the Second Six Weeks will begin at 7:00 a.m. Tuesday, July 19th. Classes will meet on Saturday, July 23.
- f. The last date for late registration, changing or adding courses, will be Friday, July 22.

PLEASE READ TO YOUR CLASSES THE INFORMATION CONTAINED IN ITEM THREE

4. Each department is asked to have someone present in the departmental office during the mornings and afternoons until 4:30 p.m. from Monday, July 18 through Friday, July 22, to assist with the details of registration.
