EXTRA! ALL ABOUT THOSE COTTON BOWL TICKETS!

With Abe Martin's fine Frogs already in the Cotton Bowl (probably against Navy), the Athletic Council met at length on Monday to work out the ticket situation for faculty and students. Here's the dope:

FACULTY--Tickets are half price or \$2.75. Holders of each faculty book may buy one ticket (one for each book, that is). In addition, faculty families may purchase TWO additional tickets if they wish at REGULAR PRICE of \$5.50. You'll have to take your faculty book to the Stadium to surrender the proper coupon when you buy. Faculty folk who DO NOT take their own tickets are NOT entitled to buy the two extra tickets. Please keep that in mind.

STUDENTS--Tickets are half price or \$2.75 and can be bought only on presentation of the Student Activity card at the Stadium. Students who wish may purchase ONE additional ticket at the regular price of \$5.50 for a date.

WHEN TICKETS MAY BE OBTAINED: Faculty and students may get their Cotton Bowl tickets at the Stadium office next Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday ONLY. That's Nov. 28, 29, and 30 and Dec. 1. Since Monday is a school holiday (see below) that's not too much time. But Cotton Bowl officials insist on that deadline so that any tickets left may be used to fill the thousands of orders piled up. So don't say you weren't told.

Incidentally, since there will not be a Skiff until late next week, the faculty can really help by passing the word along to their classes the first of next week. It will really be appreciated.

FAITH OF THE FACULTY

An interesting recent survey shows that 210 members of our faculty family belong to 33 faiths and denominations. Only 9 members marked "no preference" on their cards. As might be expected, Disciples of Christ lead with 25 members. The others, in order, are: Methodist 21, Baptist 24, Presbyterian 19, Catholic 5, Episcopal 6, Lutheran 5, Unitarian 3, Jewish 2, Brothers 1, Congregational 1, Nazarine 1, African Episcopal 1, United Church of Canada 1, and non-affiliated Protestant 7. You know, there are some 33 faiths and denominations represented in the student body.
