
REGISTRATION FOR SECOND SIX WEEKS

Jerome Moore, director of Summer School, announces that registration for the second six weeks term will be held on Monday, July 16. The following procedure will apply:

- a. Registration for those who did not attend the first six weeks will originate in the office of the Registrar between 9 a.m. and 12 noon and between 1 and 4:30 p.m.
- b. Students who registered for both the first and second six weeks but who do not expect to continue during the second six weeks term should drop their courses in the Registrar's office on Monday, July 16 or before.
- c. Students who enrolled for the first six weeks, but did not enroll for the second six weeks, and who now wish to attend may add courses on July 16.
- d. Students who registered for the second six weeks but who desire to make changes (drops, adds, or changes of section) may do so on Monday, July 16.
- e. Classes for the second six weeks will begin at 7 a.m. Tuesday, July 17. Classes will meet on Saturday, July 21.

Each department is asked to have someone present in the departmental office during the mornings and afternoons until 4:30 p.m. from Monday, July 16, through Friday, July 20, to assist with the details of registration.
