Star-Telegram 20 Years Old

Banquet and Special Edition Commemorate Paper's Birthday.

FORT WORTH, Texas, Feb. 1.—

The twentieth anniversary of the founding of the Star-Telegram publishing organization was celebrated here Monday night with a banquet in the Texas Hotel. Amon G. Carter, president and publisher, presided at the "family gathering," at which nearly 400 employes and their wives were present.

Appreciation was expressed by the head of the firm for the spirit of co-operation and loyalty which the employes have shown him and the paper and expressions of appreciation were in turn made by the employes for Mr. Carter's leadership.

Among the officials associated with Mr. Carter since the beginning of his career as publisher are Jimmy North, editor in chief; Jimmy Record, managing editor; B. M. Honea, business manager; A. L. Shuman, advertising manager, and A. I. Lundberg, mechanical superintendent. Many employes holding other stations have also been drawing pay checks signed by Mr. Carter for a score of years.

Commemorating the anniversary, the Star-Telegram, now the Star-Telegram and Sunday Record, published on Sunday a 186-page newspaper, a creditable edition detailing the resources and possibilities of Fort Worth and the West Texas section. Special sections were devoted to the growth of the city, its churches, schools, etc.
