

Gurram Konda.

H.62 Aerolite, an angular fragment; on one point a black crust remaining, with which the whole had been covered; colour of the rest, ash grey; compact fine granular fracture, like sandstone; with shining particles of a silvery metallic lustre interspersed; feels harsh; is hard; not easily fragible, much less friable, immersed in water many air bubbles are disengaged; specific gravity 3.682

I got this small specimen from Mr Skinner at Chittoor who I understood had received it from the Dunganoor Rajah who resides not far from that place, among the hills near Gurramconda, where it fell in the year 1814 as I am informed by Mr Surgeon Stewart.
