COL. REIFF NAMED BY COUNCIL

The Inter-University Council of the Dallas-Fort Worth Metropolitan Areas (that most promising association of TCU, SMU, NTSU, TWU and SW Medical School) has named our own Col. Stanley G. Reiff'as executive secretary. He will take command of a new central office located in the Great Southwest Industrial Area.

Stanley came to us in 1961 as assistant professor in engineering after a most distinguished career in the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers. He holds the B.S. from UofNebraska and the M.S. from MIT. He'll be on leave while working for the Council. That organization, you may recall, is a voluntary association of the schools doing graduate work in this huge North Texas area. They will work together on many programs (our TCU-SMU Grad Engineering M.S. for instance) and explore such possibilities as exchange of students and faculty, library resources, a central computer facility, etc. The effort is attracting much attention over the country.
