37 NEW FULLTIME FACULTY FOLKS

By the latest count, we have 37 new members joining the fulltime faculty this Fall. Two or three others may be added ere classes start. A complete listing (along with changes of assignment and title plus parttime assignments in Day Schools) will be handed out at Saturday's general faculty session.

Taking the figures compiled last week for a questionnaire (with all Deans submitting their own count), it seems our faculty for Fall semester will total 497. This includes fulltime and parttime but no Grad students. They hold 162 Ph. D. degrees (other Doctorates not asked for in the questionnaire). Here's the tabulation:
