It's that time again. Some \$2,400,000 is needed. For long years now, TCU has played the biggest role in the effort of the Educational Division.

After a meeting Monday afternoon, our many divisional chairmen will be handing a pledge card to every TCUer early next week. In filling them out, please remember that we are supporting <u>62 agencies</u> with this single annual gift. Pledges may be paid by payroll deductions over a 10-month period (the easiest and best), by asking UF office to send bills on dates stated, or by cash. All cards should be returned to departmental and divisional chairmen as quickly as possible-and not later than Oct. 5. Our gifts will have to AVERAGE more than \$20 to meet our quota so please give it a lot of thought.

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PRAYER FOR THE NEW SESSION

The prayer given by Jim Farrar, Chaplain of the University, at our first faculty meeting Sept. 12 was so moving that several folks have asked that it be printed. We are most happy to oblige for it is indeed challenging:

"Eternal God: As a faculty we assemble before thee and pray thy blessing upon this university in the academic year now convened. We acknowledge that thou art the Author of all life, all reality, all truth; and that ours is, therefore, a sacred task.

"We pray thee help us, who are professors of the partial and the incomplete, so to teach that what we know may be seen with greater accuracy and that what we do not know may be placed as a challenge before our students and ourselves.

"May we regard the term just begun not only as one year of our lives but as a large part of the university careers of our students and as an occasion to further the frontiers of man's knowledge.

"Keep us honest before mystery, patient before complexity, responsible before opportunity. Combine our varied gifts into one community, one university; and bless every worthy endeavor. In thy Providence may this year enrich the tradition and history of Texas Christian University. Amen."

UNIVERSITY VS MULTI-VERSITY?

Last Summer, we heard one of California'a bright young educators speak forcefully on the "new role of colleges and universities". Main Point: We must stop selling an "experience" for each student and concentrate on vending the "product", i. e. degrees and the training they infer. We shouldn't be concerned with anything else.

This talk, pungently entitled "Goodbye to Prexy", was something of a shocker, striking hard at long-held convictions that we have some responsibility for the social, moral and spiritual welfare of young folks as well. And it points up one of the major controversies now raging in U.S. higher education.

J. Douglas Brown, Dean of Faculty at Princeton, took up the cudgel most effectively in the <u>Atlantic Monthly</u> recently: "Bigness and diversity make it ever more difficult to reinforce in the minds and purposes of the multiplying numbers of persons and groups the values which should motivate the whole...The 'University' traditionally re-asserts its true function is to reinforce a sense of values in society. The 'Multi-versity' appears to emphasize useful knowledge; the University the humane values and personal development of each student and scholar. One assumes values and dedication are a man's own business; the other, through its way of life and example, enhances the values and dedication of those taking part in its way of life.

"To the exponent of the liberal University, the obligation transcends the development and distribution of knowledge, no matter how useful. It stands for those basic civilizing concepts which free men from ignorance, prejudice, arrogance, hatred, greed and cynicism... A liberal University is <u>NOT NEUTRAL</u>. Knowledge is neutral. And those who believe that obligation stops when it is distributed over the lecture desk or through the printed page should recall the impotence of the German universities in counteracting the obscenities of Hitler.

"Out of date? A job for the church and family? No tampering with personal concerns? We must remember the communication of values goes on--overtor not. We cannot take responsibility for providing the environment for 4 or 7 years of the most impressionable period of a man's life and then claim we are neutral in influencing that value system of his life. The Church and family may preach--the university communicates <u>assumptions</u>."

Words for thought. If you get a chance, read Dr. Brown's entire article. You'll be stimulated--and challenged.
