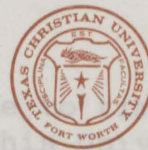

OUR UF EFFORT TREMENDOUS!

Readers of this here Bulletin may, from time to time, suspect that Ye Ole Ed is sorta proud and fond of this University and its people. Last week, as he made ready the first report on TCU's United Fund effort, the Ole Boy almost soared off into the stratosphere. For with a goal of \$10,000 (an all-time record), the very first checkup totaled a resounding \$10,376.65!

Since then, contributions and pledges have continued to come in until at this writing, our effort now comes to \$10,785.63. With 525 of our people responding (about 95%), that's a whopping AVERAGE GIFT of some \$20.60. The quota for all colleges and universities in the area was \$21,000. We just hauled off and gave half of it in one fell swoop. Dr. Robert Naylor of Baptist Seminary (Education Chairman) was elated and sent his warmest congrats to us all.

Credit must go to many of our people, especially the Divisional Chairmen. They did a top job. Many of our areas (notably Brite, Business and Administration which averaged more than \$30 per pledge) were outstanding but it was huge AnnRan that won the day. With 170 of their people giving (100%), the Arts & Science folks came in with \$4,156--a \$24.40 average. Most remarkable. And sacrificial pledges came from all over campus. You can't help but be fond of such people and we say again: "You just can't beat TCUsers!" Thanks again to everyone.

THIRD OF UNDERGRAD GALS IN SORORITIES

Of the 2,093 women enrolled as undergrads this Fall, 699 (or 33.3%) are actives or pledges in our Sororities, according to a recent Pan-hellenic report. Of the 625 entering freshmen women, 230 (36.8%) became pledges. Each of the 10 groups is "allowed" 75 members and all but three are at capacity.

A right interesting report from Grad School shows that 127 students are working on Doctoral degrees this fall--109 of them fulltime. Also, 721 are doing Master's work, 526 on a part-time basis and 195 full-time. Total Grad enrollment, of course, is 858.

By Ph. D. areas, Chemistry has 20 (all full-time); English has 36 (29 full-time); Math 24 (16 full-time); Physics 28 (20 full-time) and Psychology 29 (24 full-time).

Later, it will be printed for distribution to the 18,000 Newcomen members and to all major libraries of the country. The Chancellor has been working on the address for several weeks. It should be a really grand night for him--and TCU.
