

### CHANCELLOR REPORTS TO TRUSTEES

"Twenty-four Septembers ago I was extremely hopeful that something of significance might be done in connection with our institution. On the basis of what has happened here during these intervening years, I am far more optimistic and enthusiastic now than I have ever been before".

So began Dr. Sadler's report at the annual fall meeting of the Board of Trustees Friday morning. In citing reasons for his optimism, the Chancellor mentioned record-setting graduation of 992 persons in 1964, which is more than the total for University's first 53 years' existence; the 12.3 increase in Graduate School enrollment; representation of 42 religious groups, 27 foreign countries and 46 states other than Texas in current enrollment.

The Board took formal action in adopting a two-fold advisory board program which will include special meetings with administrative officers defining specific phases of TCU work and life and the selection of additional persons to serve two-year periods in an effort to acquaint more persons more completely with the University's role.

The recommendation that a doctoral program in history be started in the Fall of 1965, was approved. Chancellor Sadler recommended faculty salaries be increased as systematically and as substantially as possible.

Special attention was given the imperative building needs...including a research laboratory, communications building, home economics facilities and new gymnasium.

Dr. T. T. Swearingen, executive director of the Texas Association of Christian Churches, was elected to the Board. Seven trustees were re-elected for four-year terms, 13 persons were named to the Advisory Board, four honorary trustees were appointed, and officers were re-elected.

Dr. Sadler closed his report with the moving, emphatic statements of TCU's philosophy that climaxed his widely-acclaimed Newcomen address.

## SUMMER SESSION ABROAD IN 1965

The Department of Foreign Languages, headed by Dr. John Hammond, is announcing its summer session at the University of Madrid in Spain in cooperation with the Institute of European Studies. Six semester hours' credit, traveling and living with selected Spanish families are elements that make it an exciting plan.

Dr. Hammond, who directed TCU's Monterrey Tech program 1951-58 and who has taught and studied on several occasions in Mexico, will be the director.

Leaving New York by air June 17, the group may take a field study trip, Plan I, beginning with a tour of Paris and other interest spots in France, an academic program of four weeks in Madrid and excursions to nearby sites of interest. Plan II will begin from Madrid July 31 with visits to European and English cities and return leaving London On Aug. 28.

Details of the scenic stops, academic highlights and program plans make even the confirmed "stay-at-homer" want to wander. Dr. John will be happy to supply all askers with additional information.
