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#### HCN ENROLLMENT MAY CLIMB

Harris College of Nursing will reap benefits in the Spring from the new Nurse Training Act's provisions for student loans. Allowing students to borrow up to \$1,000 per academic year, the act has an attractive cancellation clause for up to 50 per cent of the loan. The new provision authorizes the appropriation of \$3,100,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1965, to the secretary of Health, Education and Welfare. More details on TCU's portion and arrangements will be forthcoming.
