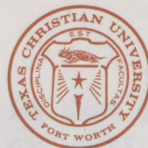

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MET STAR IN OPERA PRODUCTION

Frances Yeend, a leading soprano of the Metropolitan Opera, joins our chorus and orchestra in presenting "An Evening of Opera" on Ed Landreth stage tonight (Wednesday) at 8 o'clock. Sponsored by the TCU Fine Arts Guild, the program will be repeated on Friday night so everyone will have a chance to attend. It will mark the first time that a resident artist of the Met has appeared in one of our productions.

Many of our people are involved in the ambitious show. Bev Henson will direct, John Cogdill will be stage director, Dolores Tanner in charge of costuming and Henry Hammack serves as technical advisor. Two works by Puccini will make up the program and from what we hear, it will be good. Tickets are \$2 for adults and \$1 for students.

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SUMMER INSTITUTE IN ENGLISH

Happy we are over the recent announcement of that Summer Institute for Secondary Teachers of English. Financed by a \$46,567 grant from the Office of Education (Dept. of H-E-W), it will be directed by Karl Snyder June 7-July 16. Some 45 teachers will participate. Also due to take part are Lyle Kendall, Eilene Rall and Jim Watsatt as well as visiting lecturers and specialists.

Of course, the Summer Institute in Science and Mathematics on exactly the same dates had been announced some time before. To be directed by Dan Jarvis this year, it is supported by a \$96,260 grant and will enroll almost 100. Mabel Reavis, C. R. Sherer, Ed Heuer, Russell Faulkner, F. M. Lisle and Joseph Morgan are on the faculty. Still another large program for campus this Summer is under negotiation and should be announced soon. Looks like things will be happening during the hot weather.

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COUNSELORS' CONFERENCE SET

Tomorrow (Thursday) we'll host the third annual College Counselor Conference with registrars, student aid officers, deans of students, admissions officers from most of the area's colleges and universities taking part. Anna Byrd Wallace, Jewel Potter and Calvin Cumbie have done most of the planning for what looks like a most helpful program. Jeff Horn will introduce the luncheon speaker. SPRING SEMESTER ENROLLMENT: 6,335

Final and complete figures for Spring semester show an enrollment of 6,335 Calvin Cumbie reports. This is a decline of 107 students or 1.6% from last year--and almost exactly what Calvin forecast some weeks ago. As you'll recall, the Fall semester total was 6,855-- a decline of 1.5% as the new boost in tuition went into effect.

As it has been for some time, Grad School was again the star performer this Spring. With 799 students, it has an all-time record enrollment for the semester and a gain of 9.1% for the period. The old record was 732 set in 1964. All other divisions were down. They are: Day School Undergrads 3,773 (down 24 students or 0.6% from 1964); Brite Divinity School 140 (down 24 or 14.6%); Evening College 1,623 (off 126 or 7.2%).

More than a dozen campus groups and divisions are helping on the project with Libby Proffer once more coordinating the overall effort. It promises to be a top affair.

ANNUAL REPORT OF PLACEMENT BUREAU

Mr. Raymond (Bear) Wolf, that genial gent who survived more than 28 years of high-pressure football coaching at TCU, UofN.C., Uof Florida and Tulane, has completed his annual report on the operations of our Placement Bureau which he directs so effectively. It covers the period Sept. 1, 1963 to Aug. 31, 1964 (reports are delayed a year so the Bureau can determine to some extent what happened to those who were seeking--or were sought for--jobs).

The report shows there were 787 interviews of our students by 103 firms from over the U.S. and that 174 firm representatives visited campus. A total of 478 seniors, alumns and others registered with the Bureau, there were 485 direct employment opportunities and 158 persons are known to have accepted positions. In the part-time employment area, there were 996 registrations, 1092 referrals and 431 known placements. The list of firms that visited on campus reads like "Who's Who" of U.S. Business--some making several return trips. Bear also includes this time a five-year summary which shows an annual increase in all phases of the Bureau's activities. Interesting item: Over the five years, there have been 5,495 student interviews on campus. A very fine report.
