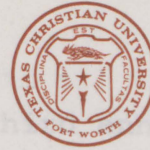

With Robert Penn Warren (twice winner of the Pulitzer Prize) as the speaker, annual Creative Writing Day Convocation will be held tomorrow (Thursday) morning in Ed Landreth. Lorraine Sherley will preside as Committee chairman and Moffitt Cecil will introduce the author of "All the King's Men". Winners in the 13 creative writing categories for the year will be announced as well as recipients of several writing scholarships.

The Day's program includes the luncheon in SC Ballroom with Jim Corder presiding, a reception for our guest speaker and award winners at 3:30 p.m., awarding of the Bryson Poetry Prize and other all-school event winners. The publication of the prize-winning entries will be distributed after the Convocation. Betsy Colquitt, Tom Copeland, Ann Gossman, John Graves, Joseph Nicholson, Karl Snyder, Thelma Cash and Cecil Williams are other members of the Committee.

A VERY FINE "HONORS DAY"

With no hesitation at all, we pronounce our third annual "Honors Day" of last week the best yet. The various events were well planned and attended. And congrats to Betsy Feagan Colquitt on winning the Honors Faculty Recognition Award (formerly Alpha Chi Professor of the Year).
