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LAST WEEKS OF 92ND SESSION

Two weeks from tonight in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum, Gov. John B. Connally will address the largest graduating class in our 92-year history. It will be the last Commencement over which Dr. M. E. Sadler will preside as Chancellor. Indications are we'll hood some seven Ph. D. candidates and award some 730 other degrees. 'Twill be an evening to remember and all faculty folks are urged to make plans now (see last page of this Bulletin).

Remember too, this is the last day for dropping a course. "Dead Week" opens tomorrow (Thursday) with final exams starting a week hence. Our last faculty luncheon is set for next Wednesday. Things move toward the final curtain.

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LARRY SMITH RETURNS TO ACADEMICS

Last week's announcement that Dr. L. C. Smith, Vice-Chancellor for Student Life, had accepted appointment as Academic Dean of William Woods College in Fulton, Mo., came as no real surprise to close friends. For a long time, Larry has had a deep hankering to return to the academic area of college work. As you may recall, he came to us in the Summer of 1956 as professor of philosophy but before reaching campus, was asked to assume the additional duties of Dean of Students as Dr. T. F. Richardson retired.

He did a terrific job too, quietly building up a real "Personnel Division"--sometimes under trying conditions. Friends were fond of pointing out that while you didn't HAVE to be a professor of philosophy to be Dean of Students, it sure helped. Larry used all his skill, patience and learning in the exacting job. But underneath, you always suspected he longed to return to the class-room and the more scholarly pursuits. He's been an effective staff member, a good friend, fine administrator. The whole campus wishes him the "very best". Howard Wible, who takes over as Dean of Students, has all the qualifications too. We predict he'll do a top job.

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COMMITTEE TO STUDY LIGHTING

An <u>ad hoc</u> committee of L. W. Ramsey, Deans Jo Ann James and Jewell Wallace, A. Melton has been asked by V-C L. C. White to study additional lighting needs for the campus and nearby streets. They will "determine what is required, desirable and feasible" since it is obviously impossible to illuminate the entire campus area. REMINDER: TRAVEL TAX FREE

Be reminded that under the law, TCU faculty and staff members are exempt from federal taxes while traveling on University business by train, plane or other "common carrier". However, it is imperative that EACH person ordering such tickets present a tax exemption certificate to the agent at the time the order is placed. These can be obtained from the office of L.C. White, V-C for Fiscal Affairs. Under our policy, the University is unable to reimburse employees for amounts included on their travel tickets as federal excise taxes. So please, get those certificates in advance.

The only requirement for exemption is that the staff member be traveling on University business. Travel on sponsored research grants also qualifies but travel for another organization (such as professional associations) does NOT.

FACULTY PROCESSIONALS BACCALAUREATE-COMMENCEMENT

The Faculty will assemble for Baccalaureate on Sunday, May 30, at 7:00 p.m. on the walk south of Landreth Hall. (In case of inclement weather, the processional line will form in the north hall of Landreth Building.) Faculty members are requested to arrange themselves in two lines of equal length as quickly as possible. The processional will move into the auditorium promptly at 7:30 p.m.

For Commencement Exercises the night of Wednesday, June 2, the processional will form at 7:00 p.m. between the Stadium scoreboard and the basement or service entrance to Daniel-Meyer Coliseum. The faculty group will form at the head of the graduating classes or closer to the Coliseum entrance. (In case of rain, the place of assembly will be just inside the service entrance). The processional will move onto the main floor of the Coliseum promptly at 7:30 o'clock. Faculty members with regalia may drive in the South Gate of the Stadium Grounds and use the parking lots south and west of the Stadium if they wish.

Again, Faculty members are asked to assist the Marshals by forming two lines of equal length as quickly as possible after reaching the assembly areas.
