

SECOND TERM ENROLLMENT MONDAY

The Summer Session reaches the half-way point this weekend with final exams for Term I on Friday and registration for Term II next Monday in the Coliseum. If the 10% drop from 1964's record enrollment holds good for the second period, we'll register about 1,700 for the late Summer session. Indications are that Grad School will again be the only division with an increased figure.

Summer Commencement is set for the evening of Aug. 27 at 7:30 o'clock in the Coliseum. We'll be awarding honorary degrees to Dr. Cary Croneis, Chancellor of Rice U. who will be the speaker, and to Dr. N. Quentin Grey, minister of First Christian Church here, and Dr. William T. Gibble, Brite grad now minister of University Christian in Austin. Right now, it seems we'll be granting some 300 degrees which, added to June's 747, will give us over 1,000 graduates in a calendar year for the first time. Of course 'tis hoped that all faculty folks will take part in the academic processional that evening if at all possible.

THIRD MANAGEMENT SEMINAR ON

Our third annual Management Seminar, during which some of the top business and professional leaders of the area get five days of intensive, high-level discussion, is now under way. As directed by Saul Sells of the Institute of Behavioral Research and Dean Ike Harrison of the School of Business, 'tis a first-rate affair and receives high praise from all those taking part.

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39 "NEW" DORM ROOMS

That remodeling work going on in Colby Hall and Milton Daniel dorms will give us 39 "new" rooms and 78 beds, V-C Cecil White reports. Actually, the project is the re-doing of the 18 chapter rooms used by fraternities and sororities before their move to the Worth Hills project. Under the plan, five "study rooms" will be retained but all the other space converted to regular living quarters. Indications are that we'll need everything available for both JoAnn James and Jewell Wallace report they have applications over capacity.

You may also recall that as of June 29, Anna Byrd Wallace reports that applications for admission are up 23.9% over the same date in 1964. Her list showed 1,055 freshmen and 188 transfers already approved with 1,143 still pending. She continues to predict a substantial increase in the freshman class for Fall. Very good.

FINE FOREIGN POLICY SHOW UPCOMING

Alumnus Roy Bacus, general manager of WBAP-TV, reports the NBC will present a three and one-half hour documentary on U. S. foreign policy over the last 20 years on Sept. 7. Apparently it will be a tremendous effort and as Roy points out, interested folks may want to mark the date on their calendars now. He didn't give the time but we imagine it will be announced later.

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OBERLIN SEMINARY TO CLOSE

Many times here we have commented on the steady and alarming decline of enrollments in the nation's seminaries. Now comes the announcement that the Oberlin Grad School of Theology, which has a distinguished record going back to 1835, will be closed in three years for lack of students. Fulltime enrollment fell to 39 in 1963-64.

On the other hand, a report from Southern Regional Ed Board this month points out that college and university grads in other fields were never in greater demand. In fact, salaries offered were up about 4% with engineering and science majors still leading but the greatest increase (about 5%) going to marketing and distribution graduates. As a "for instance", the report said a bachelor's degree in physics was worth \$636 monthly, a master's even without experience \$761 and a Ph. D. in the field \$1,261.

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HISTORICAL NOTE ON 2ND PRESIDENT

A news release from Indianapolis recently reported that the will of Addie Zollars Page, who died in 1962, had set up a \$400,000 trust to support medical missionary work of the Christian Churches. It's a sorta footnote to TCU history for her father, Dr. Ely Vaughn Zollars, was our second president 1902-1906. The report is he left TCU when our Board insisted to institute a budget and that he went to Oklahoma to found Phillips U. from which many of our people (Jim Sowell for instance) graduated. Dr. Zollars retired from Phillips in 1915 and died the next year in Warren, according to the story.

NEW CHANCELLOR GOES TO WORK

Last week, his first as our new Chancellor, Dr. James M. Moudy grappled resolutely with the many-faceted Great Task. Letters and memos poured from his desk, telephones rang endlessly, there were streams of visitors, civic meetings, frequent conferences both large and small. One huddle was with Dr. E. Leigh Secrest, new president of Research Foundation and Grad School Dean, and leaders of our Development, Public Relations, Fiscal and External Affairs Divisions on future plans and programs.

Another was with the Administrative Council in which its role, makeup and procedures were discussed. For the present, it was decided the Council will meet weekly to assure good communications, a sharing or problems and an exchange of ideas among the leaders of the University's major divisions. Despite the fact that his secretary was snatching part of a much-deserved vacation, the Chancellor's first week was productive indeed. We move steadily ahead.

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\$100,000 ON MOODY GIFT

Dr. M. E. Sadler, executive chairman of the Trustees, announced receipt of a check for the first \$100,000 from the Moody Foundation of Galveston on their recent gift of half-million. In his letter of appreciation, Dr. Sadler said the entire grant would be used for construction of our new Graduate Research Lab which will ultimately cost \$4,500,000. The plans are already being drawn.
