The event is being officially sponsored by our Board of Trustees and Dr. Oliver Harrison of Corpus Christi heads the special committee. Among those expected to take part in the program are Mayor Willard Barr, J. Lee Johnson III of the Chamber of Commerce, Dr. Granville Walker, Chancellor James Moudy. It should be a very large evening.

Some formal invitations are being printed and will be mailed soon. However, the committee emphasizes that the dinner is open to all and any admirer of Dr. Sadler will be most welcome. The tickets will be \$5.50 each—the exact cost of the dinner. Within about 10 days, they will be available in the TCU Public Relations office. Orders will be accepted by mail or phone and tickets mailed out (on receipt of check or cash) if desired. Students, exes, faculty members, staff workers, civic and business leaders, ministers and religious workers—just everyone who would like to say "thank you" to a great TCU leader will get the chance that evening.

FINE NEW EDITION OF MAGAZINE

Featuring most interesting stories and pictures of Drs. M. E. Sadler and James M. Moudy, the Fall issue of "This Is TCU", our official magazine, came from the printers last week. An eight-page, pull-out center section under the title of "Indeed a Long Shadow", attempts to outline and evaluate the University's great development during Dr. Sadler's 24-year leadership. There are most interesting pictures including one of Dr. Sadler as he "hung up his hat" in the president's office back in 1941 and an aerial shot of the campus as it was in 1942.

The lead story "tells all" about Jim Moudy with pictures of him as a campus leader in 1942 and in his new lieutenant's uniform with a new bride just before going overseas in 1943. (The Chancellor's not sure where Editor Betty Knox came up with the old shots but suspects Mary Charlotte Faris, a classmate and now our Reference Librarian). We aint telling, Mary Charlotte.

There's also a very fine article on student unrest and why by Libby Proffer (very good indeed), a story on our University seal and the man who created it, another on our Peace Corps experiences and the "Frog Club". By and large, 'tis one of the best issues so far and most interesting reading.

DIGEST OF THE FALL ENROLLMENT

Calvin Cumbie has now completed those detailed and most helpful studies he makes of our enrollment each semester. Actually, he finished early last week but there wasn't time to digest his findings in Ye Bulletin. Some of the highlights: In our record registration of 7,232, we have students from 45 states (missing: Maine, N. Hampshire, N. Dakota, Rhode Island and Utah); there are 66 students from 29 foreign lands and U. S. possessions; 187 of Texas' 254 counties are represented; from other states the largest groups are from Missouri (64), Illinois (59), Oklahoma (56), California (54). There are also 40 from N. Jersey, 39 from Pennsylvania and 38 from N. York.

Of special interest is the fact that only 55.9% are from Fort Worth and Tarrant County. Last year it was 60.5%—reversing a trend momentarily of a trend of more students from outside the immediate area that had been going on for several years. Overall, 12.8% this Fall are from outside Texas and 31.3% from Texas counties other than Tarrant. Incidentally, <u>ALL</u> classes showed an increase for the year ranging from 1.5% for seniors to 22.7% for freshmen.

In special studies, Calvin shows that students are enrolled for 79,204 semester hours—an average of 10.95. Last year it was 72,456 for a 10.56 average. We have an "equivalent full-time student" registration of 5,488, an increase of 433 for the year. And as reported last week, no less than 60% are actually taking 12 or more hours—the largest percentage since 1961.

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REPEAT ON OUR P. R. POLICY

Everyone is reminded that under long-standing University policy, only the Division of Public Relations has the responsibility of preparing and releasing news stories to the mass media. Only a moment's reflection is needed to see why this must be so. Not only is P.R. equipped professionally and mechanically to do the job but has a planned program of news releasing that can suffer when everyone feels free to "call the papers" on their own. In addition, certain overall policy matters must be taken into account.

Naturally, we all want to see and read as much news as possible about TCU in the papers and on the air. But there's a right way to go about it. The Director of the News Bureau will be most happy to help in any way—and will be informed in the case of calls from other papers, radio and TV stations.

\$\$\$ NEEDED FOR OUR FLOWER FUND

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EDUCATION STRESSED IN ARMY

Our Army ROTC folks call attention to an interesting article in "Troop Topics" for August. It refutes some long-held impressions that education is not important in the service. For instance, only about 46% of Americans over 25 are high school grads—while for enlisted men and women in the Army it is 75%. Less than 9% of all our people over 25 are college grads while 73% of the Army officers hold degrees. Nationally, less than 1% of the population holds Master's or Doctor's degree while among Army officers the figure is about 20%. Concludes the article: "Education is one of the prime ingredients of military success and advancement in today's Army".

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FINE OPENING CONVOCATION

With Chancellor James Moudy at his eloquent best and the Horned Frog band (with those intriguing new Sousaphones) making stirring music, the Fall Convocation last Thursday was an unqualified success. Deep thanks to those faculty folks who took part in the processional. There were a few empty seats but on the whole attendance was good. Drs. Howard Wible and James Newcomer also made fine talks.

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"ANTIGONE" TO OPEN SELECT SERIES

A modernized version of Sophocles' Greek tragedy, with some of the Cleveland Playhouse's most gifted performers in the leading roles, opens our Select Series next Thursday night (Oct. 14) in Ed Landreth Auditorium. The curtain goes up at 8 p.m. Single admission tickets which will be on sale at the door are \$2.50. However, there is still time to get season tickets at a great saving.

CLARIFICATION ON MERIT SCHOLARS

While confirming that we have 24 National Merit Scholars this Fall, Logan Ware writes to point out that six of them are from outside sources—not three as reported recently. There are three new freshmen in this category. Overall, we have 13 freshmen, 8 sophs and 3 juniors on Merit awards. The Rocco C. 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NOTE ON RE-MAILING PERMIT MAIL

Seems that many of our publications (such as the magazine, events calendar, etc) bear a printed mailing permit—and they go out just fine as long as they are sent in <u>BULK</u> by the University. The problem arises when individuals send out five or six of them to friends or relatives. When this happens, even when proper postage is attached, the printed permit must be <u>MARKED OUT</u> to conform with postal regulations. Just X-out the permit statement with pen or pencil and 'twill help.

FREE ADMISSION TO L. T. EVENTS

Jack Cogdill, new Chairman of Theatre Arts, has announced a new policy for faculty tickets for Little Theatre offerings. As an experiment, all <u>full-time members</u> of Day Schools and Colleges (as well as their spouses and children) will be admitted to the first two productions <u>free of charge</u>. The shows are "The Rape of the Belt" on Oct. 15, 19-23; and "The Fantasticks" Nov. 11-13.
