U. F. EFFORT SOARS OVER \$13,000!

The power, generosity and concern of our "Campus Family" never ceases to amaze. Last year, when we pledged a record \$10,800 to the United Fund, our colleagues over the area were unbelieving. This year, when we were handed a goal of \$12,200, (just about half of the Higher Education total) some of us were dismayed. We had too little faith.

Last Wednesday, when we sent down a first official report, 510 TCUers had pledged no less than \$12,718.81! Since then, an additional 22 cards have come in and the total now stands at \$13,177.81. And at least one Division and several individual cards are still to come in. There's no telling just how high the final figger will climb."I am tremendously proud of everyone on campus", Dr. James Moudy said. "When it comes to meeting community responsibility, our people are just outstanding!"

INITIAL GRANTS BY RESEARCH FOUNDATION

Grants to 21 professors for research in specific projects this year have been announced by Dr. E. Leigh Secrest, president of the Research Foundation. Under the new four-point program recently outlined, they have been awarded on formal applications in a manner similar to that of the National Science Foundation. They total \$264,000 for 1965-66.

BOTANIST TO LECTURE HERE

Dr. Katherine Esau, Russian-born, emeritus professor of botany of UofCalifornia, Santa Barbara, will lecture in Faculty Center next Wednesday night (Oct. 20) at 7:30. Sponsored by Sigma Xi and the Scientific Research Society of America, she will illustrate her address with color slides. The program is free and open to the public. Art Ehlmann, Sigma Xi president-elect, will introduce the speaker who has published many books and articles on plant anatomy.

ANALYSIS OF FRESHMAN CLASS

A detailed analysis of our entering freshman class by Anna Byrd Wallace brings out some interesting points. In numbers, there are 634 women (up 29.9%), 508 men (up 26.6%) and the 1,142 total is up 28.4% over last Fall. (Note: Calvin Cumbie's 1,433 total and 22.7% increase includes all freshmen, not just entering class). Anyhoo, 'tis the largest freshman class ever, comes from 44 states, five foreign lands. There are 214 from 18 Fort Worth schools (up 21.5%) and 228 from Tarrant County)up 29.5%). In all, 515 high schools are represented—vs. 422 in 1964.

Qualitatively, Anna Byrd finds the group about even with last year. Those listed in the upper quarter of their graduating classes totaled 47% (against 49% last year), in the second quarter 32% (against 27%), in the third quarter 18% (same as last year) and fourth quarter 3% (as against 6% last year). We have 17 valedictorians and 17 salutatorians (it was 19 and 10 last year). On the SAT verbal, our average climbed to 494 (from 491) while on math it remained at 504.

There was an increase of 22.2% of freshmen from the Christian Churches (203 total), but Baptists are up 26.2% and Methodists a whopping 32.5%. Interesting enough, the gain in Episcopalians topped them all--37.6%. There were 71 Catholics. A most interesting study, Anna Byrd.
