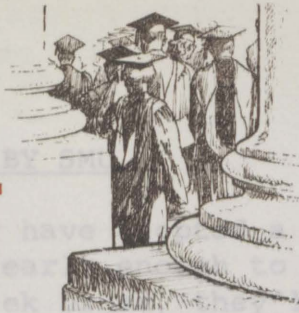

BOLD CALENDAR EXPERIMENT BY SMU

Our SMU friends downriver have adopted a calendar for 1966 which will start Fall semester early enough to have final exams BEFORE Xmas. Then after a 3½-week break, they'll start Spring semester in mid-January. Of course the idea isn't new but most schools of our area have been waiting to see if all (or most) could make the move at the same time to avoid some obvious disadvantages. The most important, perhaps, is the fact that the early Spring semester start will knock out the possibility of transfers from other schools (notably State institutions) where Fall semester runs until late January.

Our Calendar Committee of University Council (Calvin Cumbie, Jerome Moore, Howard Wible and A. Melton) went on record last week as favoring a similar change--when it becomes more widely accepted. There's no doubt but that the "lame duck" period of Fall semester AFTER Xmas--usually just a week of classes before "Dead Week" and exams--should be abolished. Usually momentum has been lost and some time wasted. But SMU's decision to go-it-alone at this time is pretty drastic. Incidentally, our Committee adopted calendars for 1969-70 and 1970-71 under their mandate to keep five years ahead in this important area. They follow our present pattern--for now.

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U.F. WRAPUP: "TREMENDJOUS!"

While 'tis likely that a few late, late cards will come in before our final report tomorrow (Thursday), a pretty good evaluation of our United Fund effort this year is now possible. It can be summed up in one word: "Tremendjous!" With a goal of \$12,200, 551 of our people (some 98% of those on the monthly payroll) pledged a whopping \$13,416.81. That's an average of \$24.35.

Almost all of our academic divisions were 100% in participation. The deans and department heads who served as Division Chairmen did an outstanding job and we cannot refrain from slingling out Fine Arts, Brite and Business for exceptionally high average gifts. And once more huge AddRan supplied more than half the total with several Departments doing exceptionally well. But overall, it was a wonderful team effort and as Chancellor Moudy points out, the University has reason to be mighty proud.

Incidentally, it might be of interest to know that of our total, \$7,604 was thru payroll deduction, \$5,212 in cash and \$600 by billing by U.F. Deep thanks to all those who gave and to all those who helped conduct the campaign.

LIBRARY HAS 530,000 "ITEMS"

That was an interesting report by Librarian Paul Parham on the cover of the publication "New Accessions" recently. It disclosed that our "holdings" in the Burnett Library passed the half-million mark last year and now stand at some 530,000 "items". About 2,000 additions are being made each month, Paul reports.

For each of the last three decades--1935-45, 1945-55 and 1955-65--our holdings have doubled. This growth rate is slightly higher than the national pattern. Over the last 10-year period, library expenditures have risen from \$95,000 to \$380,000 annually. At present, we are receiving 2,610 separate periodicals. There are 43 non-student members of the staff of whom 19 are professional librarians. Incidentally, Paul thinks our 800,000-volume capacity will be reached in 8 years. With understandable pride, he reports that over the first three weeks, circulation of books and materials was up 12.5% over the same period last year. He notes this is a larger gain than our enrollment and concludes library use is up sharply. Very good. Paul predicts the busiest year ever--and very well it may be.
