FALL BOARD MEETING FRIDAY

The regular semi-annual meeting of our Board of Trustees will be held Friday morning in Sadler Hall. Chairman Lorin Boswell will call the session to order at 10 a.m. Most of the present 38 regular members and others from the Advisory and Honorary Boards are expected to attend. A highlight will be the report of L. C. White, V-C for Fiscal Affairs, on the state of the University's finances including the audit for 1964-65 ('Twill show, we hear, we narrowly held to our tight operating budget for the year).

Chancellor James M. Moudy will make his first report to a regular Board meeting--that one back in late Summer was a called session. He plans to discuss many aspects of our work including revision of Centennial Goals, the new statement of philosophy and objectives, upgrading of faculty salaries--a matter with which he is greatly concerned.

Incidentally, the Board is made up of outstanding men who give unstintingly of their time and devction. They take avid interest in all phases of our program, have provided top leadership and mature decisions in many a tough spot. They're a grand group.

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SADLER DINNER FRIDAY NIGHT

It now seems that more than 500 friends and admirers of Dr. M. E. Sadler will gather in the Hotel Texas Ballroom Friday night to honor and say "thank you" to the man who led TCU so effectively for 24 years. Despite some conflicts (such as the big Assembly Ball) reservations have poured in and a large crowd has been assured.

Remember, dress is "informal" for all but those at the head table. The event begins promptly at 7 p.m. Sitting with Dr. Sadler will be his daughter Ann Elizabeth and her husband, Willard Swaney, of Dallas. But in one sense, just about everybody in the hall will be his "family" for the evening for few men are more respected and loved. Should be a really wonderful occasion.

COOPERATIVE DEGREE IN PHYSICS

Under a new plan worked out by Chairman Joseph Morgan of Physics, students can now work toward a B.S. in the field while taking time out (for a semester) to work in industry. Such students can be enrolled for a semester or Summer session, use the next Semester or Summer for regular jobs. The program stretches over six years. A total of 132 S.H. is needed with 15-21 hours as electives. The folks at Ling-Temco-Vaught were especially interested in starting such a plan, Dr. Joseph reports.

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QUARTET ON S.S. TUESDAY NIGHT

The famed Loewenguth Quartet (master instrumentalists) appears on the second Select Series program next Tuesday night, Nov. 9, in Ed Landreth. Founded in 1929, it is one of the best-known musical groups in the country. It is made up of first and second violins, viola and cello. They have just returned to the U.S. after a two-year tour abroad. Their appearance will be one of the musical highlights of the campus year so hope you can make it.

Our students will be admitted free to the program while tickets to others are \$1. The complete program, including dinner, is \$3.50. 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STRONG VOICE FROM DISTANT PAST

In February 1903, Chairman T. E. Shirley of the TCU Trustees made a speech. The occasion was the completion of a new "Girls Home" and "Townsend Hall" on the campus at Waco--providing "boarding facilities for our large and growing school and ample accomodations for our popular departments of Music and Oratory". Last week, a copy of the address was added to our historical papers by Pauline Shirley Haile of San Mateo, Calif., daughter of Mr. Shirley who sent it to Dr. Sadler.

Full of pride, hope and dedication to "Religious Higher Education", 'tis a moving statement pointing out that in addition to the fine, new three-story buildings, it was proposed to finish the fourth floor of Main Building, with heating plant with "tubular boilers and all necessary radiators and connections". Also, the structures were to be wired for electricity and bathrooms, with closets, to be installed as soon as there were proper sewer connections.

We wish there was space here to carry the entire statement but these sentences will give you the flavor: "No religious people has ever succeeded in large measure who have not made Christian Education the fundamental question...We ought to have at least 100 young men in our Bible College. We not only need ministers badly but educated men and women in the professions and all walks of life...To build up TCU is a missionary work, and the first step in carrying out the Great Commission of our Lord. No sacrifice ought to be counted too dear in this great cause...We need an endowment of not less than \$1 million in the next 10 to 15 years...Great improvement is not accidental, but the result of positive faith, earnest resolve and patient toil...With profound gratitude to the Giver of all good, for His past mercy and blessings, let us face the future with hopefulness and courage".

That year, TCU enrolled 302 students, gave 3 degrees, had as new president E. V. Zollars who quit in 1906 when the Board suggested that he prepare and use a budget! The great voices still speak to us strongly from the past.
