# READY! SET! GO .... Almost!

The inauguration of Dr. James M. Moudy as the University's chancellor on Friday will be a most impressive and highly meaningful event in the lives of all members of the TCU family. The first formal installation of a chief executive officer here in 49 years has been skillfully planned and scheduled.

To facilitate everyone being at the right spot at the right time, here are a few last-minute reminders:

- ...TCU faculty will assemble along the corridor adjoining the Ex-Lettermen's Club Room on the north side, lining up against the outside wall. The faculty should assemble as soon after 9 a.m. as possible; the processional will start promptly at 10 a.m.
  - ..Drs. Malcolm Arnoult and Paul Wassenich will serve as marshals for the processional, assisting in the arranging of two lines of TCU faculty. They will be wearing identifying badges.
  - ..ALL campus offices will be closed from 9:30-11:30 a.m. on Friday so that <u>all</u> employees may attend this significant event in the University's history.
- .. The elevator in the Student Center will be in fulltime use Friday and faculty members are asked NOT to use it that day only.
- ..NO classes will be held Friday so that students, along with faculty and all TCU employees, can overflow Daniel-Meyer Coliseum in a mass demonstration (a popular trend) of the truly important aspect of the event.
- ..The inaugural luncheon will be attended by the representatives of colleges, universities, learned societies and organizations and chief administrative personnel. Although the persons involved in planning would like to have extended invitations to the entire TCU faculty, such was not possible for an on-campus luncheon that has the ballroom bulging literally with more than 700 diners.

# BIBLE SCHOLARS CONSULT HERE

The TCU campus was the meeting place Friday for the American executive committee of the International Greek New Testament Project, with Brite's Jack Suggs chairing the patristics section.

Headed by Dr. E. C. Caldwell, president of Claremont School of Theology in California, the entire endeavor is the work of American and British scholars in collecting all evidence that bears on the New Testament. Dr. Kenneth W. Clark of Duke U. and Dr. Bruce M. Metzger of Princeton Theological Seminary joined in the all-day session of considering forms and schedules as well as comments from German, French and English scholars on the soon-to-be-published volume of Luke.

Of vital importance to the religious work and all the persons subsequently touched, the project's outgrowths will be of interest and concern to all.

# SECOND GRANT FROM FOUNDATION

Announcement has been made of a \$3,000 grant to Dr. Charles Blount of the physics department by the Research Corporation of New York.
