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CONGRATS ON PROMOTIONS. TENURE

Our Trustees, in session on campus this (Wednesday) morning, approved promotions for 21 faculty members and tenure status for 29. The retirements of eight veterans of faculty and staff, including three former department heads, were approved. In other actions. the Board okayed a record budget of \$10,645,862 which provides salary increases for every worker on campus, boosted the tuition rate from \$25 to \$30 per semester hour, doubled the Student Center Fee (to \$10), raised rental rates on some dorm rooms, approved awarding of 7 honorary degrees.

As always, recommendations for promotions came through department heads, deans and the V-C for Academic Affairs. These were formally approved: To full Professor--Jim Corder (English), Paul Wassenich (Religion), Leo Baggerly (Physics), Clotilda Winter (Ed), Dorothy Bell' (Speech); to Associate Professor -- Tom Copeland' (English), Frank Reuter (History), Bobby Sanders (Math), Selby Evans (Psychology), Ben Strickland and Jo Ann James (Ed), Richard Douthit (Speech), John Stevenson (Business); to Assistant Professor --Marjorie Lewis and Wilson Lott (English), Jane Greenwell (Home Eco.), Billie Sue Anderson (Ed), Telete Lawrence and Fred Christen (Speech), Ted E. Klein, Jr. (Philosophy), Jean Knecht (Languages).

GRAND VETERANS TO RETIRE

In his semiannual report, Chancellor J. M. Moudy announced that three former department heads who have served a total of 90 years on the faculty, will retire this Summer. They are Drs. W.J.Hammond (History), Herbert Mundhenke (Economics) and Austin Porterfield (Sociology). Dr. Hammond, who served as mayor of the City of Ft. Worth 1937-38, joined our staff in 1924. Both Drs. Mundhenke and Porterfield came in 1937. Also retiring is Lilita McCorkle, widow of the first Dean of the School of Fine Arts, who has been teaching part-time since 1944 and full-time since 1956, and Thurman Morgan, Director of Field Work for Brite since 1950. For a second time, Dr. George B. McCowen (Accounting) will retire. He came to us in 1961 after 34 years at Oklahoma State. U. Anna Gardner, part-time in Languages since 1960, is also giving up teaching. Retiring officially is Burl A. Crouch, long-time member of the Education faculty who came to campus in 1928. Since 1956 he's held a variety of posts. Illness prevented him from being active the past year.

SEVEN HONORARY DEGREES APPROVED

Two ladies are among the seven persons approved for honorary degrees over the next six months. The awards will be made at four different events and, as always, the recommendations came from University Council. In April, the LL.D. will be conferred on Mrs. Charles Bailey of Ballinger, first woman ever elected to the presidency of the Texas Assn. of Christian Churches, at the annual assembly in Wichita Falls.

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At Spring Commencement (June 1), honorary LL.D.'s will be awarded to Randolph Clark Watson (BA and MA from TCU) now president of Kilgore College, and Sterling W. Brown (BA and BD from TCU) now president of the National Conference of Christians and Jews. The D.D. will be conferred on Gilbert D. Davis, Jr., Brite grad who is minister of the King's Highway Christian Church, Shreveport.

At Summer Commencement (Aug. 26), the LL.D. will be awarded David L. Stitt, former TCU student now president of Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary, and the D.D. to Ray Bristol (BA and BD from TCU) who is minister of Midway Hills Christian Church in Dallas. In September, the Honorary Doctor of Humane Letters will be awarded to Grace Ward Lankford, creator of the Van Cliburn International Quadrennial Piano Competition which will be underway for the second time on our campus. 'Tis a very strong Honorary Degree list.

RENOVATION OF WRIGHT DORM DUE

In discussing our Building program, Dr. Moudy said that we will "completely re-do" Pete Wright dorm in the next few months. At an estimated cost of \$120,000, partitions will be removed so that two men can be housed to each room (instead of the present four-men-in-three-rooms plan), new windows will be installed throughout, many other improvements made.

Planning for the new Physical Sciences Building is now far advanced, the Chancellor reported. Paul Rudolph of New York, former chairman of the Yale Department of Architecture, is the chief planner in association with Geren & Co. of Ft. Worth. Also being planned now is the complete renovation of Winton-Scott Hall for the Life and Behavioral Sciences. When completed (probably during the 1967-68 school year) the two buildings will become our Research Center. The \$1 million expansion of the Brown-Lupton Student Center is being carefully done and will require several more weeks of work, Dr. Moudy said. Other "urgent building needs" include new structures for Physical Ed, Communications (Journalism-Radio-TV, Speech), Home Economics, Fine Arts and proper facilities for Harris College of Nursing, the Chancellor reported.

RECORD BUDGET, SOME FEE INCREASES

The new budget figure is an increase of \$1,358,556 over 1965-66 and is, of course, an all-time record. Only ten years ago (for 1956-57) it was \$3,100,000--but that too was a record. To become effective <u>Sept.1</u>, the new budget provides salary increases for everyone. And, it has been pointed out, a similar increase is planned for next year if adeguate funds can be found. As Mr. L.C. White, V-C for Fiscal Affairs who presented the budget pointed out, our expenditures for fellowships, scholarships, grants-in-aid and other student assistance continues to increase steadily.

Tied to the rising costs, of course, is the hike in tuition rate and other fee increases. The tuition boost to \$30 per hour means a cost of about \$900 for a full-course load during the semesters of a long session. This is still somewhat below the \$1,200 rates which have been announced by SMU and Trinity (among others). The increase in the Student Center fee will help operate that facility more efficiently. The boost in dorm rentals will average about \$15 per semester and will be effective in Jarvis, Foster, Waits, Sherley, Hall, Clark, Daniel and Wright Dorms. However, some rates will be unchanged.

OTHER ITEMS AND PROGRESS REPORTS

In other areas, Dr. Moudy reported on short- and long-range plans in Development; warned that we must be careful that we do not become overdependent on Federal funds for operating revenue; reported (optimistically) on the progress of our applications for Phi Beta Kappa and Sigma Xi; discussed our 1965-66 enrollment and trends; commented on TAGER, leave of absences, Research Foundation board members, studentfaculty ratio, other matters.

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216 DOCTORAL CANDIDATES IN 1965-66

A report by Sandy Wall, Associate Dean of Grad School, shows that We had 1,433 students enroll for advance work during Summer-Fall-Spring of the 1965-66 year. Of these, 969 were seeking Master's while 216 Were Ph. D. candidates. Of the latter, 53 were in English, 38 in Psychology, 37 in Math, 32 in History, 29 in Physics and 27 in Chemistry. The arts and sciences, of course, had the largest number of Grad students--649 in all. Business listed 152, Education 287 and Fine Arts 97.

UCLA PSYCHOLOGIST TO SPEAK

Dr. Allan Jacobsen of UCLA speaks to the Interuniversity Psychology Colloquium tomorrow (Thursday) at 3:30 p.m. at Western Hills Inn in Euless. With his colleagues, he's recently published a series of studies showing that a "response tendency" may be transferred from a trained rat to a naive one by injecting ribonculeic acid extracted from the brain of the trained rat. The discovery has stimulated research in the biochemical base for learning and memory. On Friday morning, Dr. Jacobsen will be on campus to talk with Grad students and consult with Drs. Jim Dyal and Joe Hodgkins who are collaborating in a series of studies on response transfer via RNA injections.
