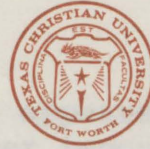
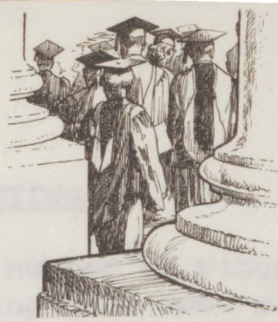

ADDENDUM TO SPRING BOARD MEETING

For a variety of reasons, a number of miscues appeared in reports of last week's Trustee meeting--and some rather important items were omitted from published accounts. For instance, we left Jim Jacobsen's name off the promotion list in Ye Bulletin (to Associate Prof), and reported Jane Greenwell's advancement to Assistant in Home Eco when actually it was a first full-time appointment. We also omitted the names of Leo Baggerly and Frank Reuter from the "Tenure" list but carried those of Dorothy Bell and Nell Robinson when both had been so approved in previous years.

The Board's approval of the establishment of a "Future Planning Commission" deserved more notice. Dr. Moudy felt it might have been the most important action of the meeting. To be drawn from the Board, faculty and administration, this Commission will be charged with the responsibility "for making projections and drawing up such recommendations for action as will produce constant improvement in the operation of the University and to furnish continued alertness to changes in the needs and obligations facing the university community". This is indeed a most important development that could actually determine the future of TCU.

In the area of physical facilities, Dr. Moudy pointed out that construction of the Physical Sciences Building, enlargement of Student Center, renovations of Pete Wright Dorm and Winton-Scott Hall are in the "blue print" stage. And while we have not as yet put architects to work on them, he listed as "urgent" the Physical Ed Bldg., a Communications Bldg., proper facilities for Home Economics and Harris College, a recital hall or general purpose gallery for Fine Arts, possibly more dorms.

In the "orientation meeting" for the Board the night before the official session, members of Student Life Division scored very high indeed. These events are planned to explain various phases of our work to the Trustees and Dr. Howard Wible and his staff did a job on "extra curricular activities". After explaining our philosophy in this whole area, Dr. Wible, Deans Jo Ann James and Jewell Wallace, Activities Adviser Libby Proffer went into details with charts. They were so good that many of us who have been on campus right along learned a great deal. Congratulations to them all.

By and large, all of the Trustees who were able to participate in any of the events last week seemed very pleased. There certainly wasn't a "discouraging word" as they checked our present situation and heard plans for the future.

JEWELL WALLACE TO GIVE UP DEANSHIP

It's now official. Jewell Wallace, the ole Frog halfback who has been Dean of Men since 1958, will give up that tough and trying post on Aug. 31. He will continue as Assistant Prof in Phys Ed. With wife Anna Byrd (she's our Director of Admissions), Jewell has a new home at 162 Revere Drive--the first time they've lived off a campus in many a day. They deserve some peace and quiet.

Jewell, after taking his B. Ed. here in 1934, became one of the top high school coaches of Texas. He won the State championship in football at San Angelo and Thomas Jefferson of San Ton. He won the State crown in basketball at El Paso high in 1941. He also won a M. Ed. from UofArizona and coached track at Tucson high. Since becoming Dean of Men here, he's spent many a sleepless night and endless hours in line of duty. Now he can even have a listed telephone! He's earned it.

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PEACE CORPS ON CAMPUS NEXT WEEK

March 20-26 has been designated as "Peace Corps Week" on our campus--apparently by the P.C. folks themselves. Many of our offices, including that of Dr. August Spain who serves as our liaison officer, have been notified that a team of Harold H. Flickinger, chief contract administrator, and Mrs. Nellie Baker will be here starting today (Wednesday) to talk with students and faculty. In advance material, they point out that over 7,000 trainees for 120 projects starting this Summer will be needed.

Dr. Spain has passed the word that any professors or instructors wishing to have a returned Peace Corps volunteer speak to a class during the period from March 21-26 may do so. Either send a memorandum (giving day, hour, room number and instructor's name) to Dr. Spain or call him at Ext. 470. He pointed out that Evening College classes are included in the invitation.

NEW RESEARCH, PLANNING UNIT

Something new, "The North Central Texas Center for Educational Services", began operating on campus Feb. 1. The brain-child of Dean Herb LaGrone and operating under the auspices of School of Education, it was created as a subcontractor under Title III of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. It services 52 school districts in seven counties and 150,000 students and 6,000 teachers may be directly or indirectly involved in its activities. Expansion is planned.

Basically, according to Ben Strickland who is the Center Director, it is concerned with helping the school districts to determine the more significant educational and cultural needs of the area, and to identify existing resources or plan innovative projects to meet those needs. Two projects--to initiate a Summer program for pre-school children and use of Ft. Worth Symphony members to present musical experiences in elementary schools--have been submitted for Federal approval. Others on the staff are Billy Turney, associate director; Duke Voyles, Research Fellow; Amy Allen, secretary. Dr. LaGrone and Les Evans, as well as other faculty members, are helping.
