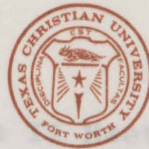

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PROCESSIONAL TO OPEN "HONORS DAY"

Everyone is herewith reminded that our fourth annual "Honors Day" observance will be opened tomorrow (Thursday) morning at 11 o'clock with a convocation in Ed Landreth Auditorium. The academic procession, led by faculty in full regalia, will launch the program. Remember, we'll gather on the walk in front of Jarvis Hall as quickly as possible after 10:45. Marshal Neil Hulings will be in charge so report to him.

Dr. George Tade, chairman of Honors Day Committee, will preside at the convocation. To be presented and/or recognized are all Pre-Honors and Honors students, presidents of our honor societies, the "Who's Who" students and those making Dean's lists for Fall semester. A highlight will be the presentation of the "Faculty Recognition Award" for 1966 to an outstanding teacher. Betsy Colquitt's dramatic episode, "A Happening", will be presented.

In other "Honors Day" events, Dr. S. I. Hayakawa (the famed semanticist from San Francisco State) will be honored at a reception 3:30-4:00 and a forum guest from 4 to 5 p.m. in Student Center. At 6:30 in the Ballroom, he speaks to the Honors Banquet. Faculty folks are invited to all events but must obtain the \$2 dinner tickets by early afternoon today (Wednesday) at the SC ticket counter. Hope everyone will be able to take some part in this important observance.

For the fourth year, we'll host the annual Region II Meet of the Texas Interscholastic League this Friday-Saturday. The outstanding students from 73 high schools of the area (from Amarillo to Tyler to Cleburne to Brownwood) will compete in 16 events ranging from track to Number Sense. Students of the top two Conferences, AAAA and AAA, will be involved here. Winners go to the State Meet in Austin.

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"GOD IS DEAD" DIALOGUE NEXT WEEK

While no one seems to have planned it exactly that way, there'll be a major confrontation of leading figures in the "God Is Dead" dispute now raging in theological circles on our campus next week. Under the sponsorship of the Philosophy Dept., Dr. Paul Weiss of Yale will arrive Monday for three appearances (see enclosed folder on times, places and topics).

Then on Tuesday, Dr. Thomas J. J. Altizer of Emory U. will arrive for two appearances under sponsorship of the Student Forums Committee. He speaks at 3 p.m. Tuesday in SC Ballroom on "America's Destiny and the Death of God". He is, of course, the scholar who is leading the newest "death of God" movement.

The big moment in the "Dialogue" here comes on Wednesday morning, April 27, when both Drs. Weiss and Altizer appear on a program in Ed Landreth Auditorium 9-11 a.m. The two men will question each other-- and be open to questions from the audience on their ideas. It should be a lively affair. Some national papers, magazines and radio-TV are showing interest. Space may be at a premium.

UNDERGRAD ASSISTANT WINS SCHOLARSHIP

Miss Frankie Belle Denton, soph from Houston and undergrad assistant to Dr. Jim Dyal in Psychology, has won a \$1,000 scholarship from the Institute of European Studies and plans to spend next year at the UofVienna. Only two awards were made to some 700 applicants so it was quite an honor. Both Dr. Dyal and Betsy Colquitt sent us the good word.

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CONCERN WITH "POOR TEACHING" REPORTS

Recently, a meeting of our Deans, Associate Deans and Director of E. C. Classes went into a matter that has plagued us for some time, i.e., the continuing reports of "poor teaching" from over campus. Dr. James Newcomer, V-C Academic Affairs, presided and pointed out that the continuing reports "must be dealt with". The discussion ranged widely: Teacher and course rating scales that could be used for self-evaluation; orientation meetings for grad and teaching assistants; use of best and most experienced teachers for FRESHMAN classes; new and improved methods of teaching (getting away from so much lecturing); reluctance of faculty to use new machines; student indifference on most important matters.

The group will come together again in early May when such facts as use of grad and teaching assistants and their preparation for the classroom will be studied. Perhaps a program of faculty visitations to other classes can be worked out. Concluded Dr. Newcomer: "We have to invite everyone to be involved. The fact that the state of mind, concerning poor teaching, exists among our students **MUST BE CHANGED**".
