From all reports, last Thursday's "Honors Day" celebration was a large success in every respect. The Convocation was well attended and an unusually large number of the faculty took part in the processional. Everyone was happy over the presentation of the 1966 Honors Recognition Award to Jim Dyal for "outstanding contributions to the intellectual life of the University". Betsy Colquitt, 1965 winner, also made news by writing a dramatic episode Which was presented instead of the usual formal speech. Made the downtown papers.

Dr. S. I. Hayakawa, the semanticist and author, did a fine job as guest speaker. His comments on the place of TV in civil unrest were stimulating to say the least. Congrats to Committee chairman George Tade, Honors Director Paul Wassenich and all others who helped plan and stage the event.

MUCH GOING-COMING ON STAFF

Last week, Chancellor Moudy accepted with much regret the resignation of John Everett, Jr., member of the Government faculty since 1959. It becomes effective on Aug. 31 so John can accept a "flattering and challenging offer"from State College of N.Y. A fine leader and teacher, he has done a top job here and everyone hates to see him go. Also made official last week were the resignations of Dan Feray of Geology (who goes to Texas Tech) and Alta Mae Summerville of the Library staff.

Each year at this time, it seems that an unusually large number of our people leave to accept new challenges. Actually, the percentage is not very large. This Spring, for instance, we've had news of eight folks retiring, eight resignations from the faculty, and one new leave-of-absence so far. At the same time, we have announced 21 additions to the full-time teaching force, including one Department Head and seven Ph. D.'s. Other appointments are pending. A bit later, Ye Ole Bulletin will attempt a complete roundup of the comings-and-goings for this Spring.

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MU "LETTER" QUOTES CHANCELLOR

The SMU "Provost's Newsletter", printed four times a year and circulated to their present and retired faculty (among others) opened a recent edition with seven paragraphs of Dr. Moudy's "Inaugural Address" of last Nov. 19. It is that section dealing with teachers and teaching-what students say they expect and what they really want, real qualification for college teaching, etc. When you read the passage again, you like it even better than the first times--and you can quickly understand why Our colleagues down-river find it worthy of repetition. In many ways, "Education Without Magic" is one of the most thought-provoking addresses in some years.

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COUNCIL TO DISCUSS "UNDECLARED MAJORS"

At its meeting on May 9, University Council will consider recommendations from a special committee on counseling for undeclared majors.

Among other things, it will be suggested that all students (and their parents) be advised of both the advantages and disadvantages of making an early commitment. Also recommended are orientation programs for counselors of undeclared majors, that all students be encouraged to adopt a major before the end of their freshman year, that they MUST select one by the end of their sophomore year. MEMORIES OF A GREAT FROG TEAM

The death last week of Blanard Spearman, swift halfback of the 1932
TCU football team, brought a sense of loss and a flood of memories
to campus oldtimers. Playing for the third season in our new Stadium
(18,500 seats), that team not only won the SW Conference title but
became the first ever to defeat all other loop members. Ranked No. 5
hationally, it won 10 games and had only a 3-all deadlock with LSU to
mar a perfect season.

That was an unusual team. Seven of the 11 starters made the A11-Conference team, a record that still stands. The guards were Johnny Vaught, who went on to some fame as coach of the Ole Miss Rebels, and Lon Evans now high sheriff of Tarrant County. A young soph end named Jack Langdon managed to letter. He's now judge of the Court of Civil Appeals and a member of the TCU Board. Yep, it was a great Frog team. In beating the UofT 14-0, it held the Longhorns to less than 20 yards running-despite the brilliance of Ernie Koy, Harrison Stafford and a quarterback named "Bull" Elkins who today is president of the University of Maryland.
