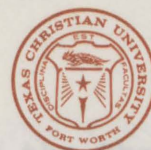

Actual announcement and presentation of awards will be made at the 12:30 p.m. luncheon in the ballroom of Brown-Lupton Student Center with Mrs. Beeman Fisher presiding. The event, with invocation by Dean Jerome Moore and a welcome by Dr. James Moudy, will be attended by the awardees, donors, judges and other guests.

The guest will discuss "Some Aspects of Shakespeare's Language" when she speaks at the 8 p.m. session in the faculty center honoring the Fort Worth chapter of the English-Speaking Union, Phi Beta Kappa and the Shakespeare Clubs.

BACCALAUREATE PLANS MOVE AHEAD

With George Fowler serving as chief marshal, baccalaureate proceedings are taking shape and plans are being made for the year's end activities which will include another record-setting number of June graduates as the listing now stands.

Dr. Donald Cowan, president of the University of Dallas and who served as an associate professor of the TCU physics department from 1956 to 1959, will deliver the address on Sunday, May 29, in Ed Landreth Auditorium. The service will begin at 7:30 p.m.

LAZY, HAZY DAYS OF SUMMER?

From June 6 to mid-July, Dr. Maurice Boyd will be keeping tabs on 45 high school teachers from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico who have been selected to participate in a six-week National Defense Education Act Institute in history. About 25 coeds will be modeling dresses and ensembles of their design and making at a fashion tea, "Blueprints for Spring," on Monday, (May 16). The event is set for 4 p.m. in the ballroom, and will be open to the public with no admission fee.

NEW CENTER TO HAVE "NEW" LOOK

The first major departure from more traditional architecture of the TCU campus will be the contemporary Physical Sciences Building, which will be the heart of the expandable TCU Research Center. As shown on the six-foot long scale model received last week, the new facility will be one of the most up-to-date university science buildings in America.

Architect Paul Rudolph of New York City, charged with the design, sees it as "a place that shows that exciting things are happening, a mid-20th Century structure that yet does no violence to the traditional Georgian architecture of the campus." Agreeing that first preliminary plans are likely to be changed and refined, the architect and University officials are working to make the center as effective as possible for teaching and research, while keeping it within the budget likely to be available.

Features, as now planned, will include: the first landscaped courtyard on the campus -- to be on the second level of the four-story building, which will be connected to the east side of the existing building at the first, third and fourth-floor levels; three 50-seat classrooms arranged on three levels in one corner of the courtyard; larger lecture rooms, including two with 250 seats each. The bulk of the research laboratories and offices will be on the east side with many offices overlooking the courtyard.

To be constructed of the TCU exterior brick, the new facility will be of the same height and same scale as Winton-Scott Hall. Space devoted to science will be more than doubled when construction is completed.

ASTRO-PHYSICIST TO SPEAK MAY 16

Dr. Frank J. Low of the University of Arizona's Lunar and Planetary Laboratory will be a guest of the TCU Research Foundation and the local Sigma Xi Club for a public lecture on May 16. As one who has helped develop new ways of looking at stars and planets, he will speak on "Infrared Astronomy" at 8 p.m. in Winton-Scott Hall Room 112.

While on the research staff of Texas Instruments in Dallas, Dr. Low helped develop instruments which made possible new observations of the infrared of stars, nebulae, galaxies and planets. This work ultimately led to the discovery of two new classes of stars and the finding that Jupiter generates several times as much heat as it receives from the sun.
