APPLICATIONS FOR FALL DECLINE

As of May 6, applications for Fall entrance had come from 1,836 freshmen--compared to 1,872 at the same period last year, Admissions Director Anna Byrd Wallace reports. However, transfers were up(412 against 352). On the basis of returns so far, Anna Byrd predicts no increase for the freshman class when a tuition increase up to \$30 per semester hour goes into effect. Last Fall, the entering freshman class jumped 28.4%.

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CAMPUS SHOT IN NATIONAL AD

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TWO NEW GRANTS RECEIVED

Didja see where R. F.Raeuchle of Physics has received a new \$43,483 grant from the Atomic Energy Commission to continue his study on the Oxidation of metals? He began the work with a \$34,789 award last year. Also last week, Harris College was notified of a \$32,400 allocation under the Nurse Training Act of 1964 to provide help to students working full-time in the nursing program. Under the plan, loans of up to \$1,000 per year can be made and 50% of them cancelled if the student goes into professional nursing.
