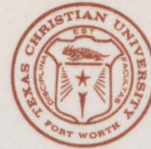
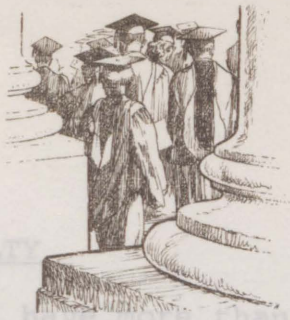

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## TICKETS FOR HUMPHREY ADDRESS READY

Individual and/or groups wishing tickets to hear Vice-President Humphrey's address on foreign policy in the Coliseum on the afternoon of Friday, July 15, may pick them up at the office of Mrs. Libby Proffer (Student Activities) on the first floor of Student Center. Or, they may be obtained by mail by sending a stamped, self-addressed envelope to the Office of Student Activities, TCU, Fort Worth, Texas 76129. As the time grows shorter, it is likely that the rush for tickets will get hotter. So please advise your classes or other groups that they should act soon.

As you know, the event is being called a "Student Convocation" and is being sponsored by our Activities Council and the University. However, anyone interested is most cordially invited to hear the Vice President who will be making his only appearance on a university campus in Texas this Summer.

Incidentally, the speech is set for 2 p.m. Humphrey is due to fly into Carswell AF Base where he'll be met by Chancellor James Moudy, student representatives and other dignitaries. He's due to come to campus by helicopter--landing probably on the baseball field. After his address, he's to conduct a 30-minute question-answer period and that evening will be a guest at a dinner downtown.

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MANY NEW APPOINTMENTS TO FACULTY

It is now pretty evident we'll have more than 40 new members of the full-time faculty next Fall. Appointments are being made almost daily by Drs. Moudy and/or Newcomer and many others are pending. Recently named were:

Dr. Wayne Ludvigson (from SW Medical School, Dallas) as associate prof of psychology; Dr. Friedrich P. Alber (from Wisconsin State) as associate of German; Dr. Eldon G. Kelly, associate of management (from Phoenix, Ariz. College); Miss Pettey C. Steele (from Uof Arizona) as assistant in psychiatric nursing; Dr. Robert G. Demaree (Ph. D. from Uof Illinois) research scientist with the Institute of Behavioral Research. Dr. Demaree will have charge of the new \$500,000 medical psychology program on the grant from the Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare.

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NSF "DEADLINE" IS JULY 1

The deadline for submitting proposals for summer institutes in 1967 supported by the National Science Foundation is July 1. HOWEVER, because of a delay in publishing the 1967 guide for such events the deadline can be met this year by submitting a LETTER instead of the finished proposal, according to a recent announcement. The proposal itself must reach the foundation not later than July 15. Anyone interested in this area might confer with Vice-Chancellor James Newcomer before Friday--that's deadline.

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TWO MORE GRANTS RECEIVED

Word came recently that we had received two more grants. A \$13,240 award came from the National Science Foundation to be used for "the general improvement of the science program". Use of the funds is not limited and in the past have been spent for equipment and books, bringing speakers to campus for consultation, financing student and faculty participation in scientific meetings. Also announced last week, thru the office of Congressman Jim Wright (in a wire to Dr. Moudy), was a \$5,000 grant for the purchase of library books. Dr. Paul Parham said we had applied early in June and the grant came thru quickly because of a July 1 deadline for its use.

By Schools and Colleges, the other totals were: Business 40, Education 45, Harris 15, Fine Arts 22. Evening College and the grad divisions do not name lists, of course. To win this fine recognition, students must be carrying 12 hours of work that count toward a degree and must be in the upper five per cent of the majors in their School or College.
